

OUR LOCAL HISTORY - continued

We believe the parsonage next to the Church was built in 1899. Dr. Bernheim refersto this home as "the best parsonage in the Lutheran Church in either of the Carolinas." Previously a house at the corner of 10th and Pine Streets had been used by the pastor's family. For the records we may now add that the parsonage next to the Church was demolished in June, 1949. The original cost of this house was \$3,000. The 50 foot well found under the front porch was the original one where the pump with its tin dipper once was. The new parsonage is now located at 2109 Wellesley Avenue.

It was in 1919 that the present Educational Building was erected. At the same time the Church was remodelled and refurnished and new memorial windows were installed. This project was completed in 1922 at an approximate cost of \$75,000. The choir was moved from the old choir loft in the rear of the nave to the new location in the right transept.

This very important renovation and building was carried on during the pastorate of Dr. John Fielding Crigler. The cornerstone for the new Education Building is on the right corner of the new addition and is dated 1920 (March 7, 1920). This part of the building program was completed first making this building available on November 1, 1920. Two years later, October 1, 1922, the Church was re-opened for services. The following were members of the Church Council at this time:

Since this time two congregations have been organized from S t. Mark's - Holy Trinity on Central Avenue in 1916 and St. Luke's in Dilworth in 1928.
