The Pastor's Pen

Dear Friends in Christ,

The Jesus we celebrate at Easter may be unseen but he is not unknown. When Peter writes, "Although you have not seen him, you love him," he is saying we know and see Christ through the eye of faith. Peter is making a contrast between himself and us, his readers. Peter knew Jesus in the flesh. He followed him, denied him, and was forgiven by him. Yet, Peter also saw the church gathered and empowered by Christ raised and alive. Peter must have been overjoyed to realize that people who never knew Jesus in the flesh, nevertheless knew and loved him through the grace of faith.

It must have astounded Peter and the disciples to see the power of the risen Christ alive in people who could not possibly have known Jesus except through faith. Peter is describing life in the power of the resurrection - the power of Easter. As Jesus said to Thomas, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe," we are blessed because we are receiving the outcome of our faith. Faith is another way of knowing.

Easter is not simply a remembrance of the past, a remembering of something that happened long ago. Jesus is not a memory; he is alive. Christ Jesus is someone we come to know through faith. This also means Easter is also not simply a single day, but a living reality that can be experienced every day.

Christianity would have disappeared long ago if it depended only upon the memorial testimony and eulogies of Jesus' disciples. The gospels are not eulogies about a wise but dead prophet. The gospels proclaim Jesus raised, alive and accessible through faith. Faith is the evidence of things unseen. Faith is "the salvation of our souls."

Yet we cannot say we love God while hating or ignoring the needs of a sister or brother whom have seen. Jesus raised stands before us alive in our neighbor. If faith is another way of knowing, faith allows us to see the reality of Christ suffering in our neighbor.

As you celebrate the sacred journey from Good Friday to Easter, remember that Jesus calls you to walk with him, serve alongside of him and rely upon him. He died so that you might live, believe, and see him in this world.



Our study this month is "Still Life" by Louise Penny. This book introduces not only an engaging series hero in Inspector Gamache, who commands his forces with integrity and quiet courage, but also a very talented, awardwinning author of traditional mysteries in the person of Louise Penny. Thus far, she has written eighteen Chief Inspector Armand Gamache novels. She lives in a small village south of Montréal.



Social Ministry



We have been offered an opportunity to help LIFESPAN celebrate it's 50th anniversary, which began right here in St. Mark's basement. They offer education, employment, and enrichment opportunities to adults with developmental disabilities. It was established in 1973, serving 5 children who were excluded from a Charlotte public school due to their significant developmental disabilities. At that time it was called St. Mark's Center and remained here, continually serving more individuals and adding new programs until in 1980 when they needed more space and moved to a different location. In 2000, the name was changed to LIFESPAN to better reflect the support and opportunities offered throughout an individual's lifespan.

We can help them celebrate their 50 years of service by participating in their health and wellness drive. The items they are requesting are: full sized men's and ladies deodorant, bath soap bars, pump hand soap, Lysol wipes, sanitary pads, sunscreen, hand sanitizer pump bottles, jars of vaseline, toenail clippers, facial tissue packets, chapstick, mouthwash, and disposable masks. (no travel sizes or hotel freebies please)

There are collection baskets in the gathering place for your donations. They will remain there until April 27 when picked up by LIFESPAN. Let's be a part of their outreach for these special individuals.



After a Covid hiatus of two years, we successfully returned to our RITI outreach. During every Tuesday in February, we hosted a total of 36 homeless men. providing them with a hot dinner, shower & laundry facilities, a warm place to sleep, breakfast in the morning and a sack lunch to take with them. Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"God Loved the World" ELW 323

This anonymous German hymn text, based primarily on John 3:16, is perfectly paired with the English psalm tune ROCKINGHAM OLD. This hymn text first appeared in a large collection of hymns (1,313 total) published in 1778. August Crull (1854-1923) made the first English translation, published in the Evangelical Lutheran Hymn Book (Baltimore, 1889). August Crull was born in Germany, but spent most of his life in the United States. He began his studies at Concordia College, and was a graduate of Concordia Seminary. Edward Miller (1731-1807) included the tune ROCKINGHAM OLD in his collection Psalms of David for the Use of Parish Churches (London,1790). In addition to being a publisher, organist, and writer, he was an accomplished flutist, and apparently played flute for the great George Frideric Handel.

"I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say" ELW 611

This hymn comes to us from the Scottish writer, pastor and editor Horatius Bonar (1808-1889). He wrote about six hundred hymns, and this one was published in 1846 with the title "The Voice from Galilee." The hymn centers on three of the sayings of Jesus found in John1:16, Matthew 11:28, John 4:14, and John 8:12. The first half of each stanza gives Jesus' invitation, and the second half gives our response. Evangelical Lutheran Worship pairs this hymn with two contrasting tunes, ELW 332, a tune by sixteenth century composer Thomas Tallis (1505-1585), and the one we sing today, ELW 611 to the English folk tune KINGSFOLD, named for the town in Surrey, England.

"Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing" ELW 807

This hymn was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790) when we was only twenty-three years of age. Born in Norfolk, England, he was sent to London at the age of fourteen to learn the barbering trade. It was there he heard the great Methodist preacher and evangelist George Whitefield. Robinson said he and his friends went to hear Whitefield for the purpose of "scoffing at the poor deluded Methodists." It was from this experience he decided to enter the ministry, first as a Methodist, then as a Baptist. Austin Lovelace writes of Robinson: in his Hymn Notes (Chicago, 1987) "Like the more famous John Newton's hymn 'Amazing Grace', Robinson's hymn is one of providence and grace. Like Jacob, who raised an Ebenezer (a stone altar which signified that God had brought him thus far), he confesses how great a debtor he is to the grace of God, as are we all". The American tune NETTLETON had its first publication in Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music (1813, Harrisburg, PA). The tune is named for Rev. Asahel Nettleton, a noted American evangelist of the early eighteenth century.

"Be Thou My Vision" ELW 793

This anonymous Irish hymn dates to the eighth century. It was translated in 1905 by Mary E Byrne (1880-1931) and then versed by Eleanor H. Hull (1860-1935) published in Poem-Book of the Gael (London, 1912). This text is a personal prayer for the vision of God throughout life, as we acknowledge God to be "my light...my treasure...my power...Ruler of all." This hymn was first joined to the Irish folk tune SLANE in the Irish Church Hymnal (Dublin, 1919), named for the hill where Saint Patrick is supposed to have defied the king by lighting the new fire at the Easter Vigil.

"What Wondrous Love Is This" ELW 666

This anonymous folk hymn is from nineteenth-century America and is paired with the Southern Harmony (1835) tune WONDROUS LOVE. Each stanza presents a single thought, which is underscored by repetition. God's love is so great that he would give up his crown for a sinner's soul.

"In the Bulb There Is a Flower"

Even though this hymn is not contained in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship, it is available in companion denominational resources. Both the text and tune HYMN OF PROMISE were written in 1985 by American composer Natalie Sleeth (1930-1992). She compares the mystery of new life in nature to the mystery of our death and resurrection. She writes: "one evening we entertained a friend, where he shared a work of T.S. Eliot in which there was a phrase something like 'In our end is our beginning'. That was the catalyst for the form of the text, which I wrote in the next day or two. I worked on the words very carefully, choosing just the right pairings, attempting to get across the idea of something inherent in something else even though unseen, and I even bought a tulip plant to contemplate the idea of the bulb leading to the flower even though the bulb itself seems dead."

"Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross" ELW 335

This gospel hymn by American hymn writer Fanny J. Crosby (1820-1915) was first published in Bright Jewels for the Sunday School (New York, 1869). Even though she was blind by the time she was six weeks old, her lack of sight seemed to help her focus more fully on the spiritual aspects of life. This hymn gives us great insight into the power of the cross, especially from someone who was sightless: "Near the cross! O Lamb of God, bring its scenes before me." Fanny pictures in her mind's eye the vision of Christ dying on the cross. The symbol of light is found in stanza two, with stanza four concluding with the commitment to watch and wait, hope and trust, forever. William H. Doane (1832-1915) wrote the tune NEAR THE CROSS and was a frequent collaborator with Fanny in providing tunes for her texts.

Hymn Suggestions: Passion/Palm Sunday, Resurrection of Our Lord, Second, Third & Fourth Sunday of Easter 2023

April 2, 2023 Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday

Today, we encounter the paradox that defines our faith: Jesus Christ is glorified king and humiliated servant. We too are full of paradox: like Peter, we fervently desire to follow Christ, but find ourselves afraid, denying God. We wave palms in celebration today as Christ comes into our midst, and we follow with trepidation as his path leads to death on the cross. Amid it all we are invited into this paradoxical promise of life through Christ's broken body and outpoured love in a meal of bread and wine. We begin this week that stands at the center of the church year, anticipating the completion of God's astounding work.

Throughout the coming Sundays of Easter the first two readings will be from the Acts of the Apostles and the first letter of Peter. Even as early Christians proclaimed the resurrection, we rejoice in the new birth and living hope we receive in baptism.

Yet the risen Christ walks with them and them opens their eyes in the breaking of the bread. Each Sunday our hearts burn within us as the scriptures are proclaimed and Christ appears to us as bread is broken and wine is poured. The story of Emmaus becomes the pattern of our worship each Lord's day.

We go forth to be signs of the resurrection and extend God's tender care to all creation.
