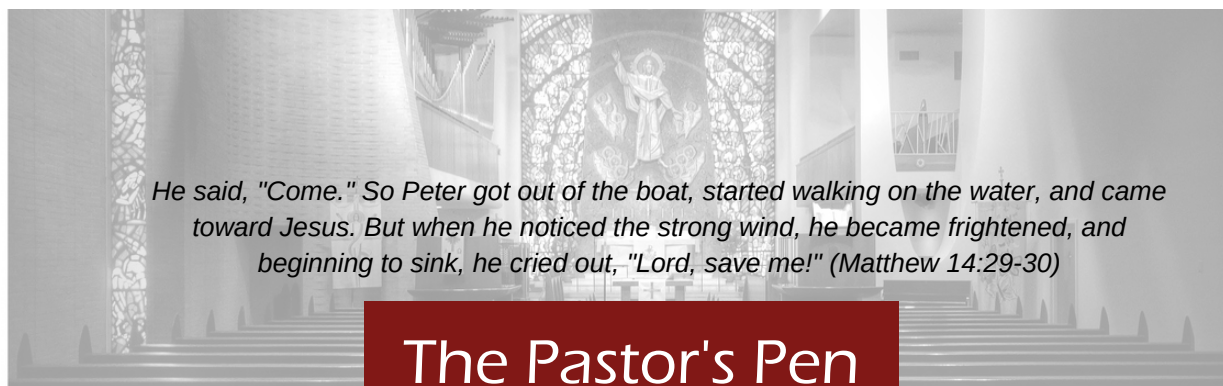

Dear Friends in Christ,

Getting up and out of bed early in the morning is frequently mentioned as a key to productivity and success. This may certainly be true, because it is the time of day when one can collect one's thoughts, working quietly before the crush of the day and its obligations begin. The early morning can be a time of grace allowing one to pray, think, and produce by listening to the voice within, leading and helping you use your gifts for others.

Thinking of this, I am reminded of Peter's getting out of the boat on the Sea of Galilee. It was early in the morning and Peter and the disciples, fearful and afraid, were in the midst of a storm. Jesus, walking on the water, spoke to them, saying, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." Encouraged by these words, Peter got out of the boat.

Getting out of the boat in a storm may seem, to many, like madness. Even a strong swimmer would be in serious danger of drowning. Yet getting out of the boat is exactly what Jesus invites us to do over and over each day. The life of faith is a bit like walking on water in a storm, always trusting in the one who invites us to follow him.

The good habit of getting up early to pray, think, and work quietly, is also crucial for the life of faith, because when the crush of the day begins, and one feels overwhelmed, it is faith that sustains and leads in the midst of the day's storms.

One of the oldest symbols of the church is a boat sailing upon the seas of life. The Latin word "navis," meaning ship or boat, is the root of "nave," a word we use to describe the interior of the church. To get out of the boat is to look beyond the safety of our "churchly" comfort zone as we walk with Jesus. As Christians and as a church we are continually called to "get out of the boat," re-envisioning our mission as a church for others in this world.

The newly installed Call Committee is tasked with discerning the Holy Spirit, who is always calling us to get out of the boat, reimagining the new thing God is doing among us. Please remember the work of this vital committee and its members as they seek to help us follow Jesus' call as a church sailing on the seas of this world.

Each day may you find grace and inspiration in the early morning, so that renewed in your spirit, you might be able to respond to others with courage and hope.

Heavy rains produced flooding in the basement on 7/8. We are thankful to our cleaning crew and property committee for prompt action!



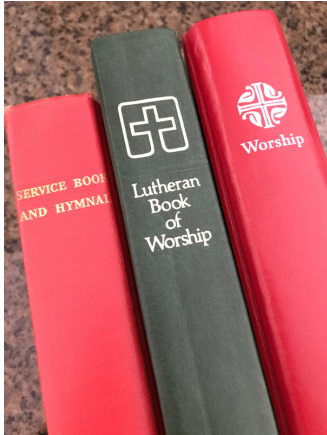

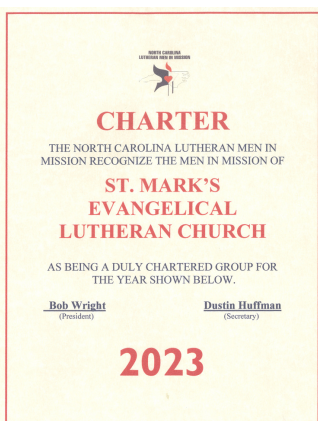

St. Mark's Book Study Group



The St. Mark's Book Study Group will meet on Thursday, August 24, at 10 am in the large conference room and via Zoom. Our selection this month is *The Exiles* by Christina Baker Kline. All are invited to participate in our meeting.

Although Australia has been home to Aboriginal people for more than 50,000 years, the British government in the 1840s considered its fledgling colony uninhabited and unsettled. They chose to relocate many of the natives and seize their property, while using the country as a colony for British criminals. In this gorgeous novel, Christina Baker Kline brilliantly recreates the beginnings of a new society in a beautiful and challenging land, telling the story of Australia from a fresh perspective, through the experiences of the story's protagonists Evangeline, Hazel, and Mathinna. While life in Australia is punishing and often brutally unfair, it is also, for some, an opportunity: for redemption, for a new way

of life, for unimagined freedom. Told in exquisite detail and incisive prose, *The Exiles* is a story of grace born from hardship, the unbreakable bonds of female friendships, and the unfettering of legacy.

Ethnic Restaurant Group



St. Mark's Ethnic Restaurant Group will dine at Enat Ethiopian Restaurant on August 15, 2023 at 7:00 PM (4450 The Plaza, Charlotte NC 28215). Ethiopia claims to have brewed the first coffee beverage. Ethiopian meals often feature a unique, yeast-raised flatbread, injera, which is made with teff (the most minute of all the seed grains). These pancakes are very pliable and may have a slight butterscotch or even sourdough flavor. Used to absorb sauces and enable in-hand eating, injera comes as gluten-free (the original method) or a wheat-flour stabilized form. It is served cold, and it tends to feel "moist". Gluten-free cookies served at St. Mark's sometimes use teff flour. Ethiopian cuisine includes familiar components such as collards, green beans, lentils, potatoes, and carrots, all done in easily recognized forms.

There are delightful beef, lamb, and chicken stews, all of which can be "kicked up a notch" and still be less spicy than some "Southern style" ribs. For appetizers, the sambusas will be familiar as samosas in another cultural context. The flavoring berbere (a red pepper) is most decidedly "hot", and awaze sauce can be mild or blazing; kitfo (tartare) and gored-gored are raw beef; express your preference carefully (e.g., "point")! This will be an exciting dinner with some new flavors and some familiar foods prepared in a different way. RSVP to Tom and Judy Tolbert (please call the church office) for seating!

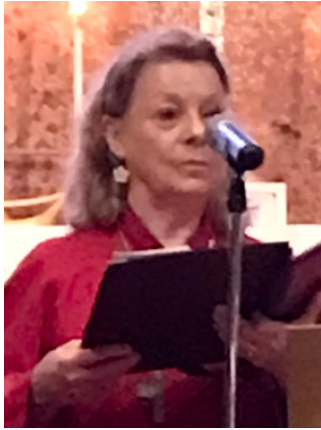

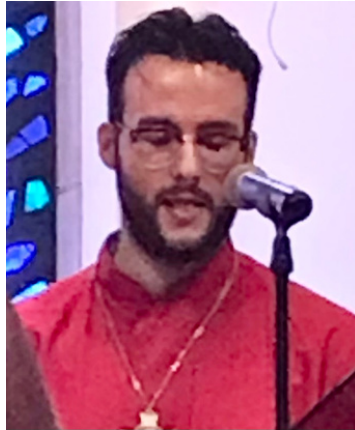

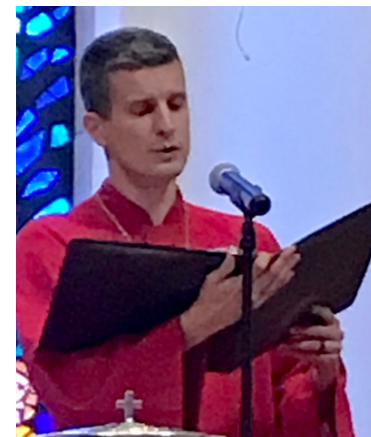

We Sing the Faith

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing

Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"Jesus Shall Reign" ELW 434

This is one of more than 600 hymns written by Isaac Watts (1674-1748), who is often referred to as the father of English hymnody. Written in 1719 as a paraphrase of Psalm 72, it is one of the earliest hymns written with a missionary emphasis, and a fine example of Christianizing the psalms, with Watts' paraphrase clearly indicating that the "King" in the psalm was Christ. The tune DUKE STREET was composed by English Presbyterian John Hatton (d. 1793), who lived on Duke Street in St. Helen's in the township of Windle, Lancaster (or Lancashire).

"Come to Me, All Pilgrims Thirsty" ELW 777

Delores Dufner (b. 1939) wrote the first version of this hymn in 1982. Dufner is an American sacred music composer, librettist and organist, as well as a nun in the Order of St. Benedict at Saint Benedict's Monastery in Saint Joseph, Minnesota. This hymn was inspired by primarily three scripture texts: John 4, with the lengthy dialogue between Jesus and the Samaritan women, John 7:37-39 in which Jesus cries out "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink", and Matthew 11:28-30 in which Jesus invites the weary and heavily burdened to come to him for rest, "for my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." The shape note tune BEACH SPRING was first included in The Sacred Harp (Philadelphia, 1844) by Benjamin Franklin White (1800-1879) and is named for the Beech Spring Baptist Church in Harris County, Georgia. Its name comes from the church's location near two beech trees and a spring. White's misspelling of the name "Beach Spring" has been retained.

"For the Fruit of All Creation" ELW 679

This twentieth century hymn comes to us from the pen of British Methodist minister and hymnologist Fred Pratt Green (1903-2000). He was encouraged to write a text on the theme of harvest and Thanksgiving, with his original title "For the Fruits of His Creation". The hymn was published in the Methodist Recorder, August 1970 with the heading "Harvest Hymn". American hymnologist Austin Lovelace writes: "This hymn states several basic themes: thanks for the harvest of nature, a call to share with others and thus do God's will, and thanks for the harvests of the Spirit: goodness, truth and love." The traditional Welsh melody AR HYD Y NOS ("the livelong night") was first published for solo and harp variations in Musical and Poetical Relicks of the Welsh Bards (1784).

"You Are Mine" ELW 581

The text and tune YOU ARE MINE are written by twentieth century Roman Catholic composer David Haas (b. 1957). This original hymn text takes inspiration from Psalm 46:10, John 14:27, and words of comfort for the refrain from Isaiah 43:1 "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by your name; you are Mine." Haas speaks of this hymn: "This song has been very popular for celebrations of reconciliation and forgiveness, and especially at healing services and funerals."

"Oh, Worship and King" ELW 842

This hymn is a metrical paraphrase of Psalm 104 by Sir Robert Grant (1779-1838). Born in India, where his father was a director of East India Company, Sir Robert is of Scottish ancestry, became a member of Parliament, and was knighted when appointed Governor of Bombay. This hymn of praise and thanksgiving celebrates in rich language the work of God's greatness as seen in nature. He uses images in describing God as "the Ancient of Days, pavilioned in splendor." The last two stanzas are more personal, with a declaration of trust to the One who is our "maker, defender, redeemer and friend," and the beginning of the final stanza "O measureless might, ineffable love." The tune HANOVER was probably written by William Croft (1678-1727), also the composer of ST. ANNE "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" ELW 632, and dates to A Supplement to the New Version of Psalms (London, 1708)

We Sing the Faith

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing

Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"Sent Forth by God's Blessing" ELW 547

Written by Omer Westendorf (1916-1997), a prominent Roman Catholic musician, this text was published in the first English-language Roman Catholic hymnal *The People's Mass Book* (1964). Westendorf's text draws together the themes of the enabling power of worship, and our being sent out into the world to carry Christ's name and share our faith. The lively Welsh folk tune *THE ASH GROVE* pairs beautifully with Westendorf's hymn.

"Be Thou My Vision" ELW 793

This Irish hymn dates to the eighth century and was discovered in two manuscripts in the Royal Irish Academy Library. The text became popular when it was first wedded to the Irish folk tune *SLANE* in the *Church Hymnal* (Dublin, 1919) and *The Church Hymnary* (London, 1927). In 1905, Mary Elizabeth Byrne (1880-1931), a scholar in Dublin, translated this ancient poem into English. Eleanor H. Hull (1860-1935) of Manchester, England, took Byrne's translation and crafted it into verses with rhyme and meter. This hymn is a prayer for the vision of God throughout life, a personal prayer as we acknowledge God to be "my light, wisdom, treasure, shelter, power, high tower, and ruler." *SLANE* is named for an area in Ireland where Saint Patrick (380-460), missionary to Ireland, challenged the local Druids with the gospel.

Seek Ye First

This popular hymn is not included in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship, but does appear in a number of supplemental collections, including *This Far by Faith* (Minneapolis, 1999). Karen Lafferty (b. 1948), an American composer, musician and recording artist, is the writer of the first stanza, as well as composer of the tune *LAFFERTY*. She is the founder and director of *Musicians for Missions*, an international ministry based in Amsterdam. *Seek Ye First* was written in 1971, inspired by a bible study on Matthew 6:33. She describes it as "a song in which people can put God's desire for their lives above their own." The second stanza is based on Matthew 7:7 and was included in *Songs for Celebration*, 1980.

Hymn Suggestions

August 13, 2023 Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost—Lectionary 19

Elijah finds the presence of God not in earthquake, wind, or fire, but in the sound of sheer silence. When the disciples face a great storm on the sea, they cry out with fear. Jesus says: "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." Amid the storms of life, we gather to seek the calm presence of Christ that soothes our fears. In comforting words of scripture and in the refreshing bread and cup of the eucharist, God grants us peace and sends us forth to be a sign of God's presence to others.

August 20, 2023 Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost—Lectionary 20

In Isaiah we hear that God's house shall be a house of prayer for all people and that God will gather the outcasts of Israel. The Canaanite woman in today's gospel is a Gentile, and outsider, who is unflinching in her request that Jesus heal her daughter. As Jesus commends her bold faith, how might our church extend its mission to those on the margins of society? In our gathering around word and meal we receive strength to be signs of comfort, healing, and justice for those in need.

In Isaiah the people are advised to look to their spiritual ancestors as the rock from which they were hewn. Jesus declares that the rock will be built on the rock of Peter's bold confession of faith. God's word of reconciliation and God's mercy are keys to the church's mission. Paul urges us to not be conformed to this world but to offer our bodies as a living sacrifice, using our individual gifts to build up the body of Christ. From the table we go forth to offer our spiritual worship through word and deed.

The prophet Jeremiah speaks of the incurable wound of his suffering yet finds in God's words the delight of his heart. When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering, Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world.

The prophet Ezekiel tells of warning the wicked to turn from their ways, and Paul reminds us that love is the fulfilling of the law. We gather in the name of Christ, assured that he is present among us with gifts of peace and reconciliation.
