

Dear Friends in Christ.

Psalm 46 is said to have inspired Martin Luther to write the hymn, "A Mighty Fortress is Our God." The opening words of this psalm, "God is our refuge and strength," remind us that no matter what is happening in our lives or world, God's presence is refuge and strength. This psalm, with its words about the earth being moved and mountains shaking in the sea, is remarkable because rather than blaming God for natural disasters and tragedies, it proclaims God's living presence in the midst of human suffering.

On March 11, 2011, while my wife and I were serving as missionaries in Japan, a powerful earthquake struck the Tōhoku region north of Tokyo where we lived, severely damaging the library of the Lutheran college and seminary where I worked and shaking our lives. During worship in the school chapel the following day, it was Psalm 46 that was read and preached on. I remember being moved by words so ancient that could also immediately become a source of God's power and hope in the present moment. This psalm continues to remind me that God is with humanity amid its troubles, always offering refuge and hope.

As we prepare to celebrate the Reformation later this month, we give thanks that in Christ God is our refuge and strength, always helping us in the present to embody the God who suffers with us. God's gift of grace frees us to live as people for others. Grace allows us to see God creating unity out of divisions and amid human crises. The church is the place where we see a diverse humanity gathered by God into a new community centered in Christ and living for others. God creates this new community in the waters of Baptism where we become one in Christ Jesus, always seeking to be a very present help – refuge and strength – to those in need.

Each year our Stewardship Appeal is the way we come together in the unity of Christ in order that we might plan our mutual mission for the coming year. This year's appeal is titled, "One in Christ Jesus," reminding us that in the grace of Baptism we are claimed by Christ and made into one body, the church. As you give thanks for God's grace, I invite you to prayerfully consider your financial support of St. Mark's as a sign of your ongoing commitment to living as Christ's body the church – a very present help to those in need.

The refuge and strength of God's grace is the one constant that is always with us so that we might live with confidence and hope for others!

A Note from the Finance Committee

Thank you for keeping up with your pledges and contributions to St. Mark's. Through July your generous contributions kept St. Mark's in very good financial shape. However, the traditional summer decline in contributions occurred in August and September. August showed a budget deficit with September tracking the same. Deficits in the summer months are not unusual as church attendance is down and this year was no exception.

Now that we are entering the final quarter of the year, please evaluate where you stand with your pledges and if you are behind, the fourth quarter is a good time to catch up. Keep in mind that gifts of appreciated stock and pledges fulfilled via IRA RMD's can be a great tax savings to you and those gifts benefit St. Mark's. As always, consult your tax advisor or CPA if you choose to give via gifts of appreciated stock or an RMD from your IRA or 401K.

Again, thank you for your faithfulness to St. Mark's and its ministries.

Update on Roofing Project

The roofing project is proceeding on track with a contractor selected and funding via a loan from the Home Mission Foundation's loan committee. If all goes to plan, we expect the roof to be completed by Thanksgiving.

The roof contract is being reviewed by legal counsel and we hope to have the contract signed shortly. The Home Mission Foundation is expected to approve our loan in the next 30 days with funds in place by the end of October. The loan is a fifteen-year note at 4% fixed interest. We intend to satisfy the loan in just a few years, and it is not too early to donate to the Roof Fund. Just make sure to note "Roof Fund" on your donations.

From the Pastor: Call Committee Update







We Sing the Faith

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee" ELW 836

This hymn was written in 1907 by Henry van Dyke (1852-1933). In addition to being a Presbyterian minister, van Dyke was professor of literature at Princeton University, a Navy chaplain during World War I, and served as an ambassador to Holland and Luxembourg. He was a prolific writer, with twenty-five books to his credit, including Book of Poems (1911) in which this hymn is included. He stated his purpose in writing it as follows: "These verses are simple expressions of common Christian feelings and desires in this present time, hymns of today that may be sung together by people who know the thought of the age, and are not afraid that any truth of science will destroy their religion or that any revolution on earth will overthrow the kingdom of heaven". Van Dyke requested that this hymn be sung to the tune HYMN TO JOY, the famous tune from the last movement of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony.

"God's Work, Our Hands" ACS 1000 (All Creation Sings)

This hymn was written in 2019 in response to the ELCA sponsored competition for a new hymn based on the theme "God's Work, Our Hands." Wayne L. Wold (b. 1954) received the top honor out of 120 submissions. All Creation Sings pairs Wold's hymn with the tune EARTH AND ALL STARS, composed by David N. Johnson (1922-1987) for the hymn "Earth and All Stars" ELW 731, as well as the Easter hymn "Alleluia! Jesus Is Risen!" ELW 377.

"In the Singing" ELW 466

iA native of New Zealand, Shirley Erena Murray (b. 1931) wrote this hymn in 1994 with the original title "Invocation" and suggests its nature. It calls on Jesus, 'the wine of grace" and "the bread of peace," in light of Christ's presence at the table as the people sing, yet are silent and expectant with question, answer, blessing, acceptance, heart's cry, and healing. Murray is best known as a hymn writer and her texts have appeared in more than a hundred collections around the world. This hymn was published in her collection Every Day in Your Spirit (1996). The tune BREAD OF PEACE was written for this hymn by Dr. Carlton Young (b. 1926) a Methodist composer and hymn writer. He writes of his hymn tune "I've tried to keep it uncomplicated with the notion that in time those coming to the distribution might sing it from memory." We sing this hymn for our Offertory, "Offering Song for Autumn" these first weeks of the early fall season.

"Faith Begins by Letting Go" ACS 1004

This hymn comes to us from All Creation Sings. It was first published in 1996 in a collection by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944) New Psalms and Hymns and Spiritual Songs. Daw is an Episcopal priest, and served many years as the executive director of the Hymn Society. Daw writes of his hymn: "this hymn affirms that faith is not a state of being, but a process of becoming what we are called to be in relationship to God, other people, and the world". This text is paired with the tune RATISBON by German organist Johann Werner (1777-1822). RATISBON also appears in Evangelical Lutheran Worship coupled with "Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies" ELW 553 by Charles Wesley (1707-1788). The tune is named for the German city of Ratisbon, now known as Regensburg.

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"Lord of All Hopefulness" ELW 765

This hymn is by English teacher, poet and novelist Jan Struther (1901-1953) was one of her eleven hymns published in Songs of Praise (London, 1931). Her hymns were among the first to address God with the pronoun "You". Paul Westermeyer writes of Struther's hymn: "this hymn is organized like a collect, the church's 'collecting' of petitions in a short form of prayer with an address, a phrase that describes the attribute of God under consideration, and a petition related to it. The themes develop from God as Lord of hopefulness, eagerness, kindliness, and calm, and relate to our daily round of waking and sleeping". SLANE is an Irish folk tune named for the hill where Saint Patrick (b. 389-460) is reputed to have defied the king by lighting the new fire at the Easter Vigil. SLANE is most famously paired with the eighth century hymn "Be Thou My Vision" ELW 793.

"God, Be the Love to Search and Keep Me" ACS 1084

This hymn text and tune comes to us from the pen of American writer, composer and theologian Richard Bruxvoort Colligan (b. 1967). This text is a lorica, a "protective armor or breastplate". A lorica was intended to be sung while dressing, arming oneself for battle, or traveling, as a protection against spiritual enemies. Its meaning is likely to be extended more generally to a prayer for the indwelling and surrounding of Christ with us on our daily journeys. The tune GREEN TYLER was composed by Colligan while he and his family lived on Tyler Street in New Brighton, Minnesota. Colligan says that the tune "started as a lullaby for our newborn son Sam."

"Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word" ELW 517

This short hymn was written by Martin Luther in 1541 for use in a prayer service. The text is a prayer asking for God's protection. This was at the time when the Turkish army had invaded Hungary and was a threat to Germany. Additional stanzas (twelve) appear in numerous publications, but probably not written by Luther. The original title appears in 1543 as "A hymn for the children to sing against the two archenemies of Christ and his Holy Church, the Pope and the Turks." Paul Westermeyer says of this hymn: 'It is a trinitarian petition--to the Father to keep us steadfast in the word of God and curb the power of those who stand against it, to the Son to defend the church that we may sing Christ's praise, and to the Holy Spirit to send peace and unity on earth and lead us from death to life." The Word of God was always uppermost in the mind and heart of Luther, and we sing his prayer asking God to keep us faithful to the Word. The tune EHALT UNS, HERR first appeared in the collection Geistliche Lieder (Wittenberg, 1543) by Johann Klug (1490-1552) and gets its German name from Luther's hymn text "Keep Us, Lord".

Hymn Suggestions

October 8, 2023 Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost—Lectionary 27

In today's gospel reading, Jesus tells a vineyard parable, which serves as an image of Israel, the prophet's mission, and Christ's death. For Christians, the vineyard also speaks of God's love poured out in the blood of Christ, given to us for the forgiveness of sin. Grafted onto Christ the vine at baptism, we are nourished with wine and bread so that we may share Christ's sufferings and know the power of his resurrection.

Even amid anxiety and hardship we rejoice in the peace of God which surpasses all understanding. With great joy we feast at the table of the Lord, and we go forth to share the wonderful invitation with others hungering and thirsting for the abundant life of God.
