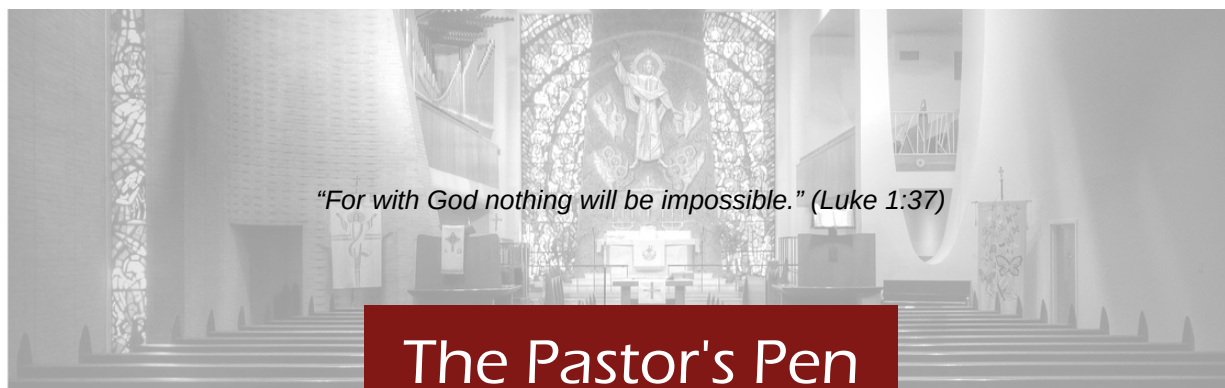

Dear Friends in Christ,

The Advent theme of waiting seems at odds with the world. Perhaps it always has, but today it seems we just can't wait for Christmas. We begin our celebration of Christmas earlier and earlier every year. The season of Advent seems like the relic of a bygone era, superseded by the cultural Christmas season. Just what are we waiting for during Advent?

As the angel Gabriel suggests to Mary, we are waiting for the advent of something seemingly impossible: the coming of Christ into human history. We are watching for God's Kairos moments, the in-breaking of Christ into human lives that more and more doubt God's presence.

If all our technological advances suggest anything, we are people who don't like to wait. We can find and order presents quickly with certainty of delivery. We call delivery "fulfillment" and the point of origin for goods, "fulfillment centers." The good news announcement (Mk. 1:15), "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand," seems to have been overcome by our own ability to fulfill the impossible.

Yet Advent's purpose helps us better understand how God fills time with meaning. God is waiting for us to fulfill time with works of faith and love in this world. Not understanding completely, yet believing, Mary and Joseph waited upon and trusted unreservedly in the impossible possibility of God's promise. To wait upon God is to be open to God's fulfillment of time in my life. The time within which we live is a brief moment of fulfillment and meaning within God's vast eternity.

The world may say, "Waiting is a waste of time," yet Advent teaches us that waiting has purpose as an act of hope in the future. We are on human journeys not always knowing where we are going but trusting that God fulfills time and the times in which we live. To be a person of faith is to be curious about where and when God will next fulfill the impossible.

We do not make the Advent journey alone. As a church we wait together; we sing, pray, and serve together. We aren't waiting for a perpetual baby Jesus, rather, we await and watch for the Savior of the nations, crucified, risen and alive. He is the Great Healer (Mk. 2:17) who helps humanity overcome its sinful brokenness and divisions, its war and suffering.

Active waiting is to be fully present in the moment. To wait is to know the fulfillment of God's time that begins in my own life. Mary and Joseph, Zechariah and Elizabeth, the shepherds, and the Magi were all present in God's moment. May you also know that nothing is impossible for God. Watch and prepare, God is fulfilling time and revealing the kingdom through you.

A QCD is one of the relatively few tax deductions you can utilize while still using the standard deduction. A QCD sends money directly from your traditional IRA to St. Mark's and because that money is going directly to St. Mark's, it isn't considered taxable income, and you won't pay taxes on the amount you donate. Roof Repair Update

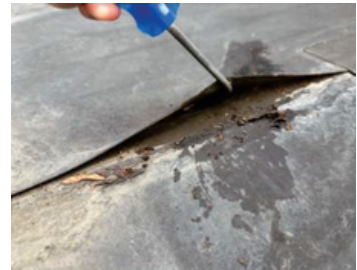
The new flat roof is installed and ready for the rains to come! Thank you to Property Committee for getting this project done on time and slightly under budget.

However, we now have an unexpected additional roof project. The Sanctuary roof was scheduled for sealing of gaps and replacement of cracked shingles as part of the flat roof replacement. Upon further inspection of the Sanctuary roof and attic, water penetration was found along with multiple gaps and cracks, making a repair a short-lived Band-Aid. Therefore, it has been determined that a complete re-roof is the best fix for the Sanctuary roof and Council will be voting on that project at its December meeting. The Sanctuary roof replacement will cost approximately \$26,000-\$27,000 assuming no issues with the roof decking. This project will include Leaf Guard gutter helmets that will prevent clogs from the surrounding trees, saving future gutter cleaning expense.

The good news is that with your help, most of the church building will have new roofing with 20-year guarantees. Property Committee has been outstanding stewards of church funds as it appears that both roof projects will cost about \$170,000 --- less than the \$200,000 originally anticipated and approved for just the flat roof.

The not so good news is that for the first time in over 15 years, the church has had to borrow money to maintain our building, albeit at a very attractive 4% fixed interest rate. We would like to get this debt eliminated as quickly as possible and ask that you prayerfully consider a donation to the newly created Capital Fund. Age is quickly catching up with our building and there will be additional capital projects just to maintain the integrity of our building, so again, any donation to the Capital Fund will go a long way to maintaining the building and reducing debt.

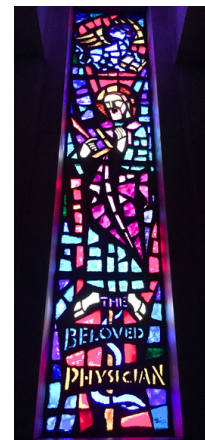
11/6 Symbolism Tour

ROOM in the INN is just around the corner. We will be hosting 10 homeless men each Tuesday during January.

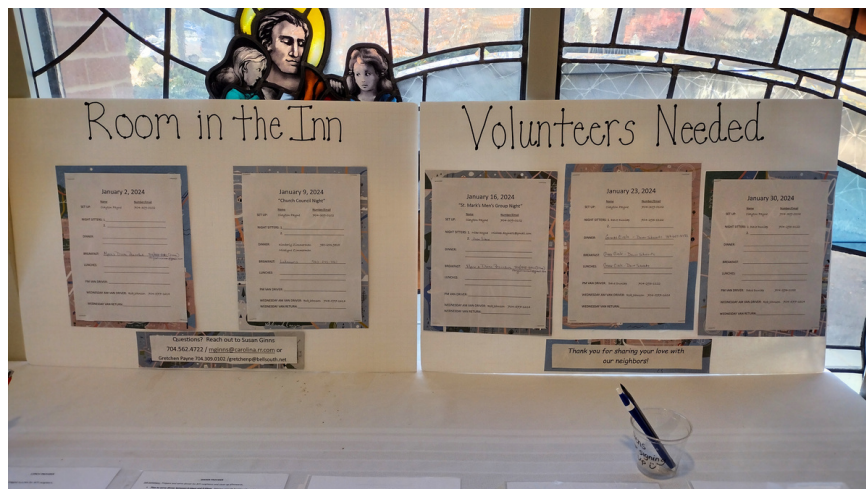

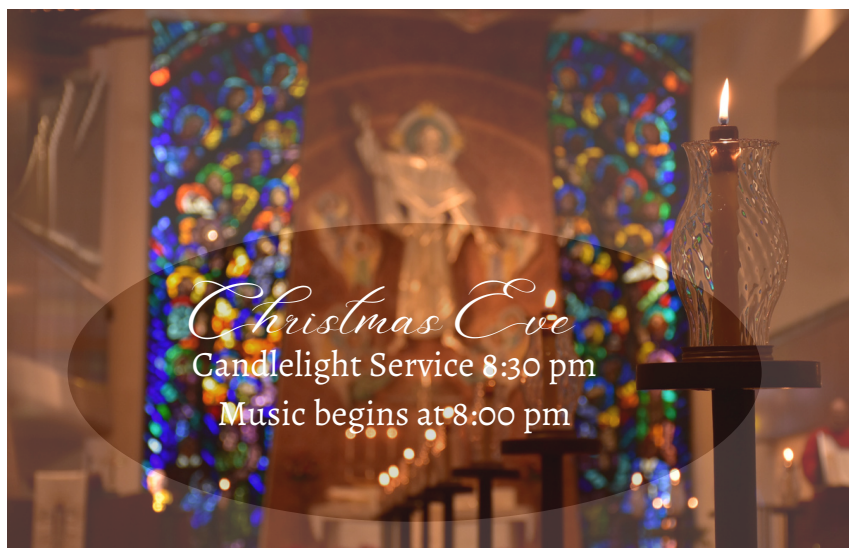

We Sing the Faith

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing
Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"For All the Saints, Who From Their Labors Rest" ELW 422

This hymn was written by William How (1823-1897) an Anglican Bishop, first published in a collection entitled Hymns for Saints' Days, and Other Hymns, By a Layman (London, 1864). A passage from Hebrews 12 is the inspiration: "since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight...and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us." American hymnologist and composer Austin Lovelace adds his insight: "the hymn gives thanks for the saints of old, makes a prayer that we may be found faithful, and acknowledges the unity of the whole Church in heaven and on earth in the mystical body of Christ, a picture of the church in holy warfare, and a vision of the victorious Church." The tune SINE NOMINE ("without a name") is one of four original hymn tunes written anonymously by Ralph Vaughan Williams, first published in the English Hymnal (1906).

"Shall We Gather at the River" ELW 423

This text and tune were written in the summer of 1864 by American composer, author, and theologian Robert Lowry (1826-1899). The author said he was seated at the parlor organ of his home in Brooklyn, NY, reflecting on Revelation 22:1 "Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb." Dr. Lowry said "the music came with the hymn." The tune HANSON PLACE is named for the church where he served in Brooklyn, Hanson Place Baptist Church.

"When Peace Like a River" ELW 785 (also known by it's refrain "It Is Well With My Soul")

This gospel song was written by Horatio Spafford (1828-1888) a successful lawyer in Chicago, whose life was wrought with overwhelming tragedies: he lost his son to scarlet fever at age 4, lost a fortune in real estate investments in the Chicago fire of 1871, and all four of his daughters were drowned in the sinking of the passenger ship Ville du Havre in 1873. It is speculated that while on a ship to meet his bereaved wife, Spafford penned the words of this hymn near the area where his daughters had drowned "When sorrows like sea billows roll..." Spafford, however, does not dwell on the theme of life's trials and sorrows, but focuses attention in the third stanza on the redemptive work of Christ and in the last stanza anticipates Christ's second coming. The tune was written by Philip Bliss, a family friend of the Spafford's, and is named VILLE DU HAVRE, the name of the ship on which 226 souls perished at sea.

"On Jordan's Stormy Bank I Stand" ELW 437

Samuel Stennett (1727-1795) an English Seventh Day Baptist preacher, wrote this hymn depicting the story of the children of Israel crossing into Canaan as a metaphor for the joys of heaven. Just as Canaan was a land flowing with milk and honey, our heavenly home is a place of pleasantness, health and joy. Because of the hardship and uncertainty of the harsh frontier life, many hymns that became popular in the nineteenth-century American frontier dealt with the subject of the heavenly reward. The tune PROMISED LAND was first published in The Southern Harmony (1835) and includes four of Stennett's original seven stanzas, with the anonymous refrain addition.

We Sing the Faith

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing
Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"Now Thank We All Our God" ELW 840

This famous German hymn is from the pen of Martin Rinkhart (1586-1649) a Lutheran pastor, poet and musician. He wrote this hymn in 1630 during the Thirty Years' War, and intended it as a table grace "Tisch-Gebetlein" ("Little Prayer at Table/Meals"). The first two stanzas are inspired by Ecclesiasticus (Wisdom of Sirach) 50:22-24 "And now bless the God of all, who everywhere works great wonders, who fosters growth from our birth." The third stanza is a majestic outburst of worship and praise to the Triune God. Johann Cruger (1598-1662) composed the tune NUN DANKET ALLE GOTT, and has been wedded to this hymn since its first publication in 1647.

"All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" ELW 634

This hymn is the work of two different authors, Edward Perronet (1726-1792), a friend and advisor of the Wesleys who later became a Congregational minister, wrote the first four stanzas, and John Rippon (1751-1836) the fifth and sixth stanzas, published in his A Selection of Hymns (London, 1787). In Rippon's hymn, the original title was "The Spiritual Coronation" with reference to Song of Solomon 3:11 "Look, O daughters of Zion, at King Solomon, at the crown with which his mother crowned him on the day of his wedding, on the day of gladness of his heart." The tune CORONATION was written for this hymn by Oliver Holden (1765-1844) an amateur American composer with a successful career as a general store owner, real estate dealer, and a member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives.

"Savior of the Nations, Come" ELW 263,

comes to us from Ambrose of Milan (340-397 A.D.), who is often referred to as the father of Latin hymnody or church song. Paul Westermeyer writes: "Ambrose was not the first to write hymns, but his hymns were the first ones the church found worth keeping." This hymn rings the keynote for Advent, with six stanzas providing opportunity to proclaim God's purpose in sending the Messiah and our response to this Good News. The hymn was translated into German by Martin Luther in 1523 and the translation begins, NUN KOMM, DER HEIDEN HEILAND (the tune name). Martin Luther is certainly revered for his reforming activities, writing, teaching and work as a pastor, but he also wrote and adapted many hymn tunes to accommodate his hymn texts, this hymn being a probable collaboration with publisher and colleague Johann Walter (1496-1560).
