

## St. Mark's Lutheran Church



Dear i fierius in Christ,

This year, the season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th. Lent is a time in which we remember that our life of Christian discipleship is a lifelong response to Jesus' call to follow him, walking the way of the cross with him in humble service to others. During the season of Lent, we are asked the deepest questions about ourselves and our journey with Jesus. "Who do I follow each day? Whose voice do I allow to rule my heart? What or who am I tempted to place before Jesus in my journey through this world?"

The prophet Joel's words remind us of the Lenten journey of self-denial and the way of the cross. Lent begins in the human heart as we "yet even now" trust anew in Jesus. The Lenten journey of forty days is a discipline of self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love. This journey is always in contrast to the world's many other voices seeking the allegiance of our hearts.

It was while I was attending a Jesuit high school that first experienced the discipline of fasting. Though I was running 10-15 miles a day on the track team, I along with several friends, fasted for 24 hours once a week. The physical experience of hunger not only drove me to prayer, it also reminded me of the many people I saw daily on the streets of Chicago who lived without enough to eat. This experience of self-denial taught me as a teenager that Lent is more than simply an outward discipline of "doing this" or "giving up that." Lent is a journey of the heart that leads to new perceptions of oneself and the world.

"Yet even now" means we need times of quiet and prayer that renew us to live in this noisy world of great need and great self-centeredness. The journey of Lent is an opportunity to rediscover the true center of our lives in discipleship to Jesus Christ, who underwent temptation and fasting in the wilderness, and who sought quiet moments for prayer.

In addition to Sunday worship, we have many opportunities for the discipline of Lent at St. Mark's. Lenten devotional books will be available at the Shrove Tuesday pancake supper. The Imposition of Ashes and Holy Communion will be available on Ash Wednesday, and Wednesdays during Lent we will gather in the Fellowship Hall for a simple evening meal followed by Lenten Midweek Prayer.

Yet even now is a time to return to God in prayer through the discipline of Lent.







## Orgelkids pipe organ workshop

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

### "As with Gladness Men of Old" ELW 302

This popular Epiphany hymn is based on the Gospel lesson from Matthew 2:1-12 for Epiphany Day and tells of the visit of the Magi. William Chatterton Dix (1837-1898) is the writer of this hymn. He was a marine insurance manager by trade, and fortunately for us, had a second career as a writer of Christmas and Easter carols and other devotional writings, including the carol "What Child Is This" ELW 296. The tune DIX was composed by German musician and composer Conrad Kocher (1786-1872) and is also wedded to the great hymn of praise "For the Beauty of the Earth" ELW 879.

## "Angels, from the Realms of Glory" ELW 275

Raised in a Moravian family of missionary parents, English hymn writer and poet James Montgomery (1771-1854) published this hymn on Christmas Eve, 1816, under the title "Nativity" in a paper he edited called The Sheffield Iris. He wrote over four hundred hymns, four of which are included in Evangelical Lutheran Worship, including "Hail to the Lord's Anointed" ELW 311, "Go to Dark Gethsemane" ELW 347 and "Lord, Teach Us How to Pray Aright" ELW 745. This poem is based on Luke 2, Matthew 2, and Malachi 3, and is a call for everyone, including the angels, shepherds, wise men, and saints, to come and worship the newborn King. The tune REGENT SQUARE was composed by Henry T. Smart (1813-1879) and named for St. Philip's Regent Square Church in London, one of the churches where Smart served as organist.

## "Songs of Thankfulness and Praise" ELW 310

This hymn received its first publication in 1862 in the journal The Holy Year by Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885). "Epiphany" means "manifestation" of Christ to the world, and the author used "manifest" twelve times to describe Christ's birth, baptism, appearance at the wedding feast of Cana, healing the sick, and his powers over evil. Thus this hymn becomes not only praise to God, but a time to learn more about Epiphany and about Christ himself. The tune SALZBURG is a late-seventeenth century German tune, probably written by Jakob Hintze (1622-1702), and the harmonization in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship is based on a setting by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750).

## "Here I Am, Lord" ELW 574

Daniel Laurent Schutte (b. 1947), an American Jesuit priest, and composer of Catholic liturgical music, wrote this hymn for commitment and sending forth of Christ's disciples for a service of ordination in 1979. It is based on Isaiah 6:8 "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!" God's mission and purpose is clearly stated, with each stanza telling the needs of the people and then the care God will provide. This hymn comes to Evangelical Lutheran Worship from With One Voice (1995). Schutte composed the tune HERE I AM, LORD. He has written over 150 hymns and Mass settings.

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

## "Come and See" ACS 976

This hymn comes to us from All Creation Sings by American composer and musician Robert Hobby (b. 1962). He wrote this hymn on a visit to England, while participating in a one-week conference seeking to reverse declining trends in the witness/ministry of Christianity. Inspired by John 1:35-37. Hobby writes: "I had considered adding additional verses from other parts of scripture...but simply sticking to the question and answer keeps it general enough for each person gathered in worship to hear the invitation in the context of their own life issues." The tune COME AND SEE was written by Hobby for this hymn text.

## "Rise, Shine, You People!" ELW 665

was written by Ronald A. Klug (b. 1939) for the Fourth Sunday after Epiphany in 1974. Paul Westermeyer says in his Hymnal Companion to Evangelical Lutheran Worship "the gospel for that day was Luke 4:21-30, where Jesus went to the synagogue with the people on the sabbath and read the scroll from Isaiah 4: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me...to bring good news to the poor...release to the captives. Or in the words of the hymn, Christ the Lord has entered our human story. So rise, shine, celebrate, and hurl your songs and prayers against the darkness." The tune WOJTKIEWIECZ was written by American composer and musician Dale Wood (1934-2003) for this hymn, and was published in Lutheran Book of Worship (1978). The tune bears Dale Wood's Polish family name, which was simplified when his family came to the United States.

## "Jesus Shall Reign" ELW 434

This is one of more than 600 hymns written by Isaac Watts (1674-1748), who is often referred to as the father of English hymnody. Written in 1719 as a paraphrase of Psalm 72, it is one of the earliest hymns written with a missionary emphasis, and a fine example of Christianizing the psalms, with Watts' paraphrase clearly indicating that the "King" in the psalm was Christ. The tune DUKE STREET was composed by English Presbyterian John Hatton (d. 1793), who lived on Duke Street in St. Helen's in the township of Windle, Lancaster (or Lancashire).

### "There Is a Balm in Gilead" ELW 614

"Balm of Gilead" was an aromatic medicinal ointment. In Jeremiah 8:22 the question is asked, "Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there?" and the expected answer in "No." But this spiritual turns the negative into affirmation, and hopelessness into hope. It is the Holy Spirit who "revives my soul," and it is Jesus who "is your friend" and "died for all." The balm is in Gilead and in every other place in this world. The African American tune BALM IN GILEAD comes anonymously from the oral tradition of the nineteenth century, where a vocal soloist sings the stanzas, with the refrain as a response by the congregation. This hymn and its tune had it first appearance in print in the collection Folk Songs of the American Negro (1907).
