

Dear Friends in Christ,

On Easter day Jesus met two disciples and accompanied them along the road to Emmaus. Though they did not recognize him, this stranger interpreted to them the things said about himself in the scriptures. The story culminates with the two disciples asking the stranger to stay with them for it was evening when they arrived in Emmaus. When he was with them at the table, he took a loaf of bread, blessed, and broke it, and gave it to them, and their eyes were opened, and they recognized Jesus with them.

This is one of my favorite stories about Jesus because it reminds me of how Jesus accompanies us on our journeys revealing himself to us. He comes often unbidden and unrecognized into our lives in the person of a stranger. This Easter resurrection story is a reminder that he is alive accompanying us on our travels in this world. He is the silent companion watching over you and he is the power of grace, causing your heart to burn with the understanding of faith in him wherever or however you are.

This story describes what we do as Christians journeying in this world: we walk with others, often accompanied by strangers who become a blessing to us. In this world as we are increasingly told to fear others, strangers, and foreigners among us, we risk turning our back upon the ones whom Jesus sends to us that he might help them through us.

I experienced this over and over during many years of mission service in another part of the world where I was often the foreign stranger who was welcomed into new community among people who also opened the scriptures to me. It goes both ways; we welcome the stranger, and we can be the stranger finding welcome in Christ. Whether I was sharing in the breaking of the bread in the Eucharist, or sharing a meal with someone of another religion, I knew and trusted that Jesus was accompanying me on my travels in this world, helping me and others grow in friendship through his presence alive among us.

We recognize Jesus in the breaking of the bread, the most tangible reality of his resurrection life among us. As you partake of the bread of life, you become living bread feeding others with his living presence so that all whom you meet will have met him in you.

His light will burn in your heart, leading you as you befriend and help others on your journey. He lives, walking with and ahead of you, and little by little through you, he gathers us into one flock – a new community of friends living in the power of his resurrection.

The Ethnic Restaurant Group will dine at Nakato Japanese Restaurant & Sushi Bar on 16 April 2024 (Tuesday) at 7:00 PM. The Nakato family has run Japanese-themed restaurant in Charlotte since 1976. The address is 8500 Pineville-Matthews Rd, Charlotte, NC 28226.

All are welcome. Nakato has an interesting water-feature to deliver various sushi items, and the hibachi chefs are as flamboyant as those you will find anywhere. The sushi rolls are particularly colorful. The hibachi offers chicken, salmon, shrimp, scallops, beef, and vegetarian treats. 



Funeral Service for Rev. Dr. Michael Frye





Pastor Michael Frye was interim pastor at St. Mark's from April 2017 to January 2019. Pastor Frye entered into eternal glory on Friday, March 15, 2024, sharing in the inheritance of the saints in light. His funeral was held at Living Saviour Lutheran Church on March 21st. We give thanks to God for Pastor Frye's faithful service to Jesus Christ and his church!





Pastor Frye served as pastor at Grace Lutheran Church, Raleigh, NC for sixteen years. Prior to that, he served as pastor of Lutheran Chapel Church, Gastonia, NC; Christ Lutheran Church, Dallas, TX; mission developer and pastor at Living Saviour Lutheran Church, Charlotte; and, as pastor of Gloria Dei Lutheran Church, Salisbury where he began his ordained ministry in 1973. Pastor Sarah Ilderton, Pastor Phil Tonnessen, and Pastor Tim McKenzie led the funeral service, and John Simon represented St. Mark's as a communion assistant.

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"God Loved the World" ELW 323

This anonymous German hymn text, based primarily on John 3:16, is perfectly paired with the English psalm tune ROCKINGHAM OLD. This hymn text first appeared in a large collection of hymns (1,313 total) published in 1778. August Crull (1854-1923) made the first English translation, published in the *Evangelical Lutheran Hymn Book* (Baltimore, 1889). August Crull was born in Germany, but spent most of his life in the United States. He began his studies at Concordia College, and was a graduate of Concordia Seminary. Edward Miller (1731-1807) included the tune ROCKINGHAM OLD in his collection *Psalms of David for the Use of Parish Churches* (London,1790). In addition to being a publisher, organist, and writer, he was an accomplished flutist, and apparently played flute for the great George Frideric Handel.

"Life High the Cross" ELW 660

was first published in 1916, and included eleven stanzas! Evangelical Lutheran Worship only includes five stanzas, with a rousing refrain. Stanley Osborne writes of this hymn: "The hymn has no room for weak resignation. It summons the mightiest and leaves them gazing upon a Love that gave its life to achieve life." American hymnologist Austin Lovelace says: "It is related to 'Onward Christian Soldiers' and 'For All the Saints' ELW 422 in its symbolism of marching in the ranks of soldiers of the crucified. It is the crucified Christ and his cross which we follow, and his love we proclaim to the world." The tune CRUCIFER was written by Sydney Nicholson (1875-1947) for this hymn text. CRUCIFER means "cross-bearer."

"Seed That in Earth Is Dying" ELW 330

was written in 1978 by Svein Ellingsen (b.1929), a leading hymn writer in Norway. Ellingsen had a major influence in the Nordic hymn renaissance of the 1960's, especially in his endeavors toward writing that reflects "the new simplicity". Many of his texts are used equally as hymns, devotional readings, and prayers. Paul Westermeyer, author of the Hymnal Companion to Evangelical Lutheran Worship says of Ellingsen's writing: "Although he has written hymns for a great variety of subjects, the theme that runs through all of them is the gladness found in one's faith, even in times of great distress". German born composer Harold Herresthal (b.1944) wrote the music for this hymn. He is organist at a church in Oslo and a professor at the Norwegian Academy of Music. The tune SAKORN SOM DOR I JORDEN gets its name from the Norwegian text.

"Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross" ELW 335

This gospel hymn by American hymn writer Fanny J. Crosby (1820-1915) was first published in Bright Jewels for the Sunday School (New York, 1869). Even though she was blind by the time she was six weeks old, her lack of sight seemed to help her focus more fully on the spiritual aspects of life. This hymn gives us great insight into the power of the cross, especially from someone who was sightless: "Near the cross! O Lamb of God, bring its scenes before me." Fanny pictures in her mind's eye the vision of Christ dying on the cross. The symbol of light is found in stanza two, with stanza four concluding with the commitment to watch and wait, hope and trust, forever. William H. Doane (1832-1915) wrote the tune NEAR THE CROSS and was a frequent collaborator with Fanny in providing tunes for her texts.

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"All Glory, Laud, and Honor" ELW 344

has established its place as the traditional Palm Sunday processional hymn. It is based on the accounts of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem found in Matthew 21, and Luke 19, as well as portions of Psalms 24 and 118. This hymn was written by Bishop Theodulph of Orleans (c.760-821), a leading French theologian and poet of his time. We believe he may have written this hymn while imprisoned in the year 818, falsely accused for conspiring against King Louis the Pious. This is one of our oldest Latin hymns, and in original form included thirty-eight two line stanzas plus the refrain! John Mason Neale (1818-1866) translated eight stanzas from Latin into English, first published in 1851. *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* prints his first five stanzas plus refrain. Melchior Teschner (1584-1635), a German pastor, cantor and teacher, wrote the tune VALET WILL ICH DIR GEBEN ("Farewell I Gladly Bid Thee") that we associate with this hymn.

"What Wondrous Love Is This" ELW 666

This anonymous folk hymn is from nineteenth-century America and is paired with the Southern Harmony (1835) tune WONDROUS LOVE. Each stanza presents a single thought, which is underscored by repetition. God's love is so great that he would give up his crown for a sinner's soul.

"Beneath the Cross of Jesus" ELW 338

Elizabeth C. Clephane (1830-1869) is the author of this Lenten hymn. She was a member of the Free Church of Scotland and devoted her life to serving the poor and the sick in her community. She was nicknamed "Sunbeam" to reflect her sunny personality and philanthropic work among the disadvantaged. This hymn was written shortly before her death and is a meditation on the cross and its importance in the faith of the believer. The numerous scriptural allusions are indicative of the poet's thorough knowledge of the Bible. The tune ST. CHRISTOPHER was composed for Clephane's hymn by Frederick Charles Maker (1844-1927) an organist and conductor in Bristol, England. Clephane's hymns were popularized in the United States by Ira Sankey, who collected gospel hymns and was the musical assistant of the American evangelist Dwight Moody (1837-1899).
