



¹Do not fret because of the wicked; do not be envious of wrongdoers, ²for they will soon fade like the grass, and wither like the green herb. ³Trust in the LORD, and do good; so you will live in the land, and enjoy security. ⁴Take delight in the LORD, and he will give you the desires of your heart. ⁵Commit your way to the LORD; trust in him, and he will act. ⁶He will make your vindication shine like the light, and the justice of your cause like the noonday. ⁷Be still before the LORD, and wait patiently for him; do not fret over those who prosper in their way, over those who carry out evil devices. ⁸Refrain from anger, and forsake wrath. Do not fret—it leads only to evil. ⁹For the wicked shall be cut off, but those who wait for the LORD shall inherit the land. ¹⁰Yet a little while, and the wicked will be no more; though you look diligently for their place, they will not be there. ¹¹But the meek shall inherit the land, and delight themselves in abundant prosperity. ³⁹The salvation of the righteous is from the LORD; he is their refuge in the time of trouble. ⁴⁰The LORD helps them and rescues them; he rescues them from the wicked, and saves them, because they take refuge in him.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 15:35-50

³⁵But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" ³⁶Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. ³⁷And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. ³⁸But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. ³⁹Not all flesh is alike, but there is one flesh for human beings, another for animals, another for birds, and another for fish. ⁴⁰There are both heavenly bodies and earthly bodies, but the glory of the heavenly is one thing, and that of the earthly is another. ⁴¹There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars; indeed, star differs from star in glory. ⁴²So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. ⁴³It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. ⁴⁴It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. ⁴⁵Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a lifegiving spirit. ⁴⁶But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. ⁴⁷The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. ⁴⁸As was the man of dust, so are

those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. ⁴⁹Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven. ⁵⁰What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. ³⁶Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. ³⁷ Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; ³⁸give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." The Gospel of the Lord.



Holy Baptism and Reception of New Member

Baptisms of William Jordan Eason and Willa Page Eason Reception of New Member by Transfer, Kristen Ruth Eason

Presentation

The candidates for baptism and sponsors gather at the font, and the pastor addresses the assembly.

God, who is rich in mercy and love, gives us a new birth into a living hope through the sacrament of Holy Baptism. By water and the word God delivers us from sin and death and raises us to a new life in Jesus Christ. We are united with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world.

The sponsors present the candidate.

We present William Jordan Eason for Holy Baptism.

I present Willa Page Eason for Holy Baptism.

The pastor addresses the candidate for baptism.

Called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, William Jordan do you desire to do be baptized into Christ?

I do.

The pastor addresses the parents.

Called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, do you desire to have your child baptized into Christ?

I do.

As you bring your child to receive the gift of baptism, you are entrusted with responsibilities: to live with her among God's faithful people, bring her to the word of God and the holy supper, teach her the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, place in her hands the holy scriptures, and nurture her in faith and prayer, so that your child may learn and trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace. Do you promise to help your child grow in the Christian faith and life?

I do.

The pastor addresses the sponsors.

Do you promise to nurture these persons in the Christian faith as you are empowered by God's Spirit, and to help them live in the covenant of baptism and in communion with the church?

I do.

The pastor addresses the assembly.

People of God, do you promise to support William Jordan and Willa Page and pray for them in their new life in Christ?

We do.

Profession of Faith

The pastor addresses the candidates. The assembly may join in the responses.

I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin and confess the faith of the church.

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God?

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God?

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

I renounce them.

The pastor addresses the candidates, sponsors and assembly.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Thanksgiving at the Font

The pastor leads the thanksgiving. The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning your Spirit moved over the waters and by your Word you created the world, calling forth life in which you took delight. Through the waters of the flood you delivered Noah and his family, and through the sea you led your people Israel from slavery into freedom. At the river your Son was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By the baptism of Jesus' death and resurrection you set us free from the power of sin and death and raise us up to live in you.

Pour out your Holy Spirit, the power of your living Word, that those who are washed in the waters of baptism may be given new life. To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever.


Distribution of Holy Communion



Music Notes

"All Creatures, Worship God Most High" ELW 835 This hymn of praise was written in 1225 by one of the most fascinating individuals in our church history, Saint Francis of Assisi (1182-1226). He was a mystic, founder of the Franciscan monastic order, and spent a good portion of his life as an evangelist, preaching and helping the poor of Italy. It is even said he preached to the birds, and they listened! The following was written in tribute to St. Francis: "Saint Francis came to preach-with smiles he met the friendless, fed the poor, freed a trapped bird, led home a child. Although he spoke no word-his text, God's love, the town did not forget". St. Francis saw all of creation, including death, as praising God. The tune name LASST UNS ERFREUEN dates to 1623 Germany, where it was originally paired with an Easter hymn with the beginning words "Let Us Rejoice'. Evangelical Lutheran Worship pairs this tune with four different hymns.

"Build a Longer Table" ACS 1062 This hymn comes to us from All Creation Sings (Augsburg Fortress, 2020) where it is included in the "Justice, Peace" section, though also listed in the topical index under "Hunger." David Bjorlin (b. 1984), a native of Duluth, Minnesota, wrote this hymn in 2017 inspired by a proposed collection of new hymns by the Hymn Society entitled Singing Welcome: Hymns and Songs of Hospitality to Refugees and Immigrants. Bjorlin writes about an early usage of his hymn: "Our pastor planned to preach about hunger and noted that this hymn seemed more about justice than hunger--longer tables, not walls; safe refuges with justice, not jails; doorways, not fences." Bjorlin paired his hymn with the French Christmas carol NOEL NOUVELET, the name of this tune being the first line of the seventh century carol. Additionally, ELW #379 pairs this tune with the Easter text "Now the Green Blade Rises."

This Week: From the Lutheran Church Calendar

February 23, Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, martyr (69-155)

Polycarp was a link between the apostolic age and the church at the end of the second century. He is said to have been known by John, the author of Revelation, and was known by Irenaeus, bishop of Lyon in France. As the age of eighty-six he was martyred for his faith. Urged to save his life and renounce his faith, Polycarp replied, "Eighty-six years I have served him, and he never did me any wrong. How can I blaspheme my King who saved me?" Polycarp was burned at the stake, his death a testimony to the cost of following Christ. Ignatius of Antioch, who was also martyred (c.110), wrote to Polycarp, "Stand firm like an anvil being struck by a hammer. It is the mark of a great athlete to be bruised, yet still conquer. Wait for him who is above time: the Eternal, the Invisible, who for our sake became visible; the Intangible, the Unsuffering, who for our sake suffered, who for our sake endured in every way."

February 25, Elizabeth Fedde, deaconess (1850-1921)

Fedde was born in Norway and trained as a deaconess. In 1882, at the age of thirty-two, she was asked to come to New York to minister to the poor and to Norwegian seamen. She founded the Norwegian Relief Society to work among immigrants. Her influence was wide-ranging, and she established the Deaconess House in Brooklyn to train women as deaconesses, which eventually became NYU Lutheran Medical Center. Fedde founded the Deaconess House and Hospital of the Lutheran Free Church in Minneapolis, and helped plan hospitals in Chicago and North Dakota.

March 1, George Herbert, hymnwriter (1593-1633)

As a student at Trinity College, Cambridge, England, George Herbert excelled in languages and music. His scholastic ability earned him a fellowship, and his skill as the Public Orator of the university attracted the attention of King James I. Herbert served in Parliament for two years. After the death of King James and at the urging of a friend, Herbert's interest in ordained ministry was renewed. He was ordained a priest in 1630 and served the small parish of St. Andrew Bemerton until his death. He was noted for unfailing care of his parishioners, bringing the sacraments to them when they were ill, and providing food and clothing for those in need. He was the younger brother of (Edward) Herbert of Cherbury the philosopher and deist. George Herbert is best remembered, however, as a writer of poems and hymns such as "Come, my way, my truth, my life" (ELW 816).
