

# First Reading Deuteronomy 26:1-11

<sup>1</sup>When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, 2you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. <sup>3</sup>You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, "Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us." 4When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, 5you shall make this response before the Lord your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, <sup>7</sup>we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. 8The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; 9and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. <sup>10</sup>So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me." You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. <sup>11</sup>Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

The Ethnic Restaurant Group will dine at Mary O'Neill's Irish Pub on March 18th at 7:00 PM. This quaint restaurant is in the center of Waxhaw: 116 W North Main St, Waxhaw, NC 28173. Traditionalists might choose soda bread, Reuben sandwiches, corned beef and cabbage, shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, beef stew, etc. They also style several types of steak burgers, salads, salmon, chicken, fish and chips, and a full bar service. Be sure to save room for Bailey's ice cream, their version of bread pudding, or other treat. There is parking in front of the restaurant and a free public lot by the side of the restaurant. From the Matthews side of Charlotte, follow NC-16 (Providence Road) into Waxhaw. The restaurant would be on your right, just after the Shell and Marathon gasoline stations and the water tower. Do not cross the railroad tracks. From the Pineville side of Charlotte (or Fort Mill), follow Johnson Road (US-521-South) and turn left on Highway 75. When you get into Waxhaw, turn left onto NC-16 to cross the railroad tracks. The restaurant would be on your left. All are welcome! Attend whenever any dinner may appeal to you. When she loses her parents in an accident, sixteen-year-old Rosanne is taken in by the owners of the vineyard where she has lived her whole life as the vine-dresser's daughter. She moves into Celine and Truman Calvert's spacious house with a secret, however—Rosie sees colors when she hears sound. She promised her mother she'd never reveal her little-understood ability to anyone, but the weight of her isolation and grief proves too much for her. # Music Notes

"When We Are Tested" ACS 922 Our Hymn of the Day comes to us from the new collection of songs and hymns All Creation Sings (2020). Ruth Duck (b.1947) an American writer, liturgical theologian and ordained United Church of Christ pastor, was asked to write a hymn that told the story of Jesus' forty days in the wilderness. It is included in her book The Poetry of Grace (2015). Duck's hymn is paired nicely with the familiar Irish tune SLANE, which is named for the hill where Saint Patrick is said to have defied the king by lighting the new fire at the Easter Vigil. This tune appears two times in Evangelical Lutheran Worship (2006) ELW 793 "Be Thou My Vision" and ELW 765 "Lord of All Hopefulness."

"O Lord, throughout These Forty Days" ELW 319 This nineteenth century hymn was written by Claudia Frances Hernamen (1838-1898) and published in her A Child's Book of Praise (1873). She had a life-long interest in Christian education, with over 150 hymns written especially for children. This hymn attempts to explain the deeper meanings of the forty days of Lent: fasting, praying, temptations, penitence which point to the joys of Easter which follows the penitential season. The shape note tune CONSOLATION was compiled by Ananias Davisson (1780-1857) in his Kentucky Harmony (Lexington, 1816). Shape notes are a musical notation designed to facilitate congregational and social singing. Shapes were added to noteheads in written music to help singers find pitches within major and minor scales without the use of more complex notation like key signatures on the staff.

# This Week: From the Lutheran Church Calendar

# March 10, Harriet Tubman (1822-1913); Sojourner Truth (c.1797-1883), renewers of society

Harriet Tubman was born into slavery in Maryland and remained a slave until about age thirty when, fearing she would be sold and moved further south, she escaped with the help of the Underground Railroad. After that, she helped about three hundred others to escape until slavery was abolished. After the Civil War, her home in Auburn, New York, became a center for women's rights and served the aged and the poor. Sojourner Truth, too, was born a slave in New York state. Her birth name was Isabella Baumfree. After slavery was abolished in New York in 1827, she was freed and, while working as a housekeeper, became deeply involved in Christianity. A number of years later, she discerned a call to become a preacher. Taking the name Sojourner Truth, she set out on an evangelistic journey, where people found her testimony to be deeply moving. In later life, she also became a popular speaker against slavery and for women's rights.

#### March 12, Gregory the Great (c.540-604), Bishop of Rome

Gregory was born the son of a Roman senator, and later became the prefect of the city of Rome. He sold his vast property and devoted the proceeds to the relief of the poor. He founded seven monasteries, six in Sicily and one in Rome. In 590 he was elected Bishop of Rome. Gregory's work was extensive. He influenced public worship through the establishment of a lectionary and prayers to correlate with the readings. He established a school to train church musicians. Gregorian chant is named in his honor. He wrote a treatise underscoring what is required of a parish pastor serving a congregation. He sent missionaries to preach to the Anglo-Saxons who had invaded England. He also organized distribution of grain during a shortage of food in Rome.
