Distribution of Holy Communion







The Ethnic Restaurant Group will re-calibrate our tastebuds at **Bad Daddy's Burger Bar** in Ballantyne on **May 20, 2025 at 6:00 PM**. Big Daddy's started on East Blvd in 2007. The Ballentyne location has good parking and safe strolling in the middle of Ballantyne: **15105 John J**

Delaney Drive, Charlotte, NC 28277. Bad Daddy's has a fervently defended reputation for being THE place for burgers on the south side of Charlotte. There are entrées other than burgers, but it's difficult to move past the concept of "burger" at this specialty restaurant. Incentive like sweet potato fries with chipotlebuttermilk-or 20 other sauces—further encourage sticking to a burger theme. The lengthy menu includes appetizers, beef, chicken, turkey, salmon, and even no-meat burgers. Possible beverages include water, sodas, Margaritas, tipsy milkshakes, and other bar items. One has the option to design a burger from scratch. The healthy column includes salads that also can be specified in detail or taken from the menu. And, there are desserts, including banana pudding and other delights. The atmosphere is friendly and festive. The service is attentive and helpful. The food is delicious. This will be an interesting place to try out a new, earlier time for dinners. Heading west on Ballantyne Commons Parkway: turn left at the last traffic light before Johnston Road/US-521 (John J Delany Drive). If you miss that turn, turn left on Johnston Road, then turn left at the first traffic light (John J Delaney Drive is a "loop" road). Heading east on Ballantyne Commons Parkway: go through the Johnston Road/US -521 intersection, then turn right at the first traffic light (John J Delaney Drive). Heading south on Johnston Road/US-521: go through the Ballantyne Commons Parkway intersection, then turn left at first the traffic light (John J Delaney Drive). Heading north on Johnston Road/US-521: turn right at the John J Delaney Drive traffic light. If you miss that turn, turn right on Ballantyne Commons Parkway, then turn right at the first traffic light (John J Delaney Drive). Music Notes

"Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us" ELW 789 gives us images for both Psalm 23 and the parable of the good shepherd in John 10. The hymn first appeared in the collection *Hymns for the Young* (London, 1836) compiled by Dorothy Thrupp (1779-1847), but we don't know for certain she is the author, as she wrote anonymously or under pseudonyms. William Bradbury (1816-1868) wrote the tune **BRADBURY** for this hymn, and it was published in his Sunday school book entitled *Oriola* (1859).

"I Know That My Redeemer Lives!" ELW 619 This hymn was penned by Samuel Medley (1738-1799) a former British sailor, converted by reading a sermon by Isaac Watts and then serving as a Baptist minster. The heart of his message is inspired by a passage from Job 19:25 "For I know that my Redeemer lives." We will sing only stanzas one through four, and eight. Please note how many times we sing the phrase "He Lives": seventeen times in just these five stanzas by my count! The tune **DUKE STREET** was composed by Englishman John Hatton, a Presbyterian who was born in Warrington, England, and who lived on Duke Street in St. Helen's in the township of Windle, Lancaster (or Lancashire).

"Praise the Lord, Rise Up Rejoicing" ELW 544 This hymn and its tune are a great example of a successful pairing of a contemporary text with a tune that was composed nearly three hundred years earlier. Howard C. A. Gaunt, (1902-1983) an Anglican priest and a schoolteacher, wrote this text and was first printed in 100 Hymns for Today (London, 1969). The tune ALLES IST AN GOTTES SEGEN ("With God's blessing is everything obtained") also ELW 589 "All Depends on Our Possessing" was composed by Johann Lohner (1645-1705) and was first penned as a vocal solo, with lots of ornamentation. Lohner wrote over three hundred songs like this one, for devotional use in the home.

This Week: From the Lutheran Church Calendar

May 14, Matthias, Apostle

After Christ's ascension, the apostles met in Jerusalem to choose a replacement for Judas. Matthias was chosen over Joseph Justus. Little in known about Matthias, and little is reported about him in the account of his election in Acts 1:15-26. Matthias traveled among the disciples from the beginning of Jesus' ministry until his ascension. According to apocryphal traditions, he is said to have preached in Ethiopia. Matthias' task, after he was enrolled among the eleven remaining disciples was to bear witness to the resurrection.
