



¹⁶One day as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a female slave who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. ¹⁷While she followed Paul and us, she

would cry out, "These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you the way of salvation." ¹⁸She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, "I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour. ¹⁹But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace before the authorities. ²⁰When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, "These men, these Jews, are disturbing our city ²¹ and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us, being Romans, to adopt or observe." ²²The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. ²³After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. ²⁴Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks. ²⁵About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. ²⁶Suddenly there was an earthquake so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken, and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. ²⁷When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. ²⁸But Paul shouted in a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." ²⁹The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. ³⁰Then he brought them outside and said, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" 31They answered, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." 32They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. 33At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. ³⁴He brought them up into the house and set food before them, and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God. Music Notes

"Crown Him with Many Crowns" ELW 855. This hymn was extracted from two six stanza hymns, twelve stanzas total. From Matthew Bridges (1800-1894) we have stanzas one, two, three, and five, and from Godfrey Thring (1823-1903) stanza four. Both hymn writers were inspired by the passage from Revelation 19:12 "and on his head were many crowns." Each stanza itemizes the characteristics of the risen Lord: "The Lamb upon his throne," "The Lord of love," "The Lord of life," and "The Lord of years." George Elvey (1816-1893) wrote the tune **DIADEMATA** for this hymn, with its first publication in the 1868 edition of Hymns Ancient and Modern. The tune name **DIADEMATA** is derived from the Greek word for crown or diadems, a royal headband.

"In Christ There Is no East or West" ELW 650 John Oxenham (1852-1941), an English Congregational Church layperson, wrote this text in 1908 for a pageant presented by the London Missionary Society, and was later published in a book of poems called Bees in Amber (1913). Oxenham's text is an example of a prophetic hymn, one that states the ideal to be achieved rather than the present situation. Austin Lovelace writes: "Unity and mission are combined, for the mark of a disciple is love for every person and the willingness to serve all humankind.". Oxenham based this hymn on Galatians 3:28 "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus." The tune MCKEE is thought to be an African American adaptation of a tune sung by Irish immigrants to the United States. Henry T. Burleigh (1866-1949) is the arranger and named the tune for his rector Elmer M. McKee at St. George's Episcopal Church in New York City. Burleigh served as baritone soloist for fifty-two years at McKee's church.

This Week: From the Lutheran Church Calendar

June 1, Justin, martyr at Rome, apologist (100-165)

Justin was born of pagan parents. At Ephesus he was moved by stories of early Christian martyrs and was led by an elderly Christian man he met there. Justin described his conversion saying, "Straightaway a flame was kindled in my soul and love of the prophets and those who are friends of Christ possessed me." Justin was a teacher of philosophy and engaged in debates about the truth of the Christian faith. In his *First Apology*, Justin's description of early Christian worship around the year 150 is the foundation of the church's pattern of worship in both the East and West.

June 3, The Martyrs of Uganda, died 1886

Christianity had been introduced to Uganda after 1877, but was made available primarily to those in the court of King Mutesa. His successor, King Mwanga II, was angered by these Christian members of the court whose allegiance was not to him but to Christ. On June 3, 1886, thirty-two young men were burned to death for refusing to renounce Christianity. Other martyrs followed. But many were impressed by the confident manner in which these Christians went to their deaths, and the persecution led to a much stronger Christian presence in the country.

June 3, John XXIII, Bishop of Rome (1881-1963)

In his ministry as a bishop of Venice, John (then Archbishop Roncalli) was loved by his people. He visited parishes and established new ones. He had warm affection for the working class - he himself was the child of Italian peasants - and he worked at developing social-action ministries. At age seventy-save he was elected bishop of Rome. Despite the expectation that he would be a transitional pope, he convened the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) saying it was time to "open the windows [of the Church] and let in some fresh air." Aggiornamento ("updating" but also translated as "modernization") was one of the keywords used by John and bishops about the council to describe a new openness to the world and modernity. The council brought great changes in Roman Catholic worship and ecumenism, changes that have influenced Lutherans and many other Protestant churches as well.

June 5, Boniface, Bishop of Mainz, missionary to Germany, martyr (c.675-754)

Boniface (his name means "good-deeds") was born Wynfrith in Devonshire, England. He was a Benedictine monk who at the age of thirty was called to missionary work among the Germanic tribes of the Frankish Empire. His work was protected by Charles Martel, and after Charles' death Boniface carried out a thorough reform of the whole Frankish Church, abolishing the practice of simony, or the selling of ecclesiastical offices, and establishing churches, schools, and seminaries. Boniface was preparing a group in Frisia for confirmation on the eve of Pentecost when he and they were killed by a band of Frisian robbers.
