

Dear Friends in Christ,

To be a Christian is to be baptized in the name of God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. It is to be one with the triune God. God is a holy mystery who lives within us through faith. This God is personal and interpersonal. We know God in ourselves, in each other, and in Christ's body the church.

The triune God is perhaps the best example of unity in diversity: three diverse persons living and working in complete unity with one another. Life in the Trinity defines the church: we are a diversity of people sharing our gifts with one another yet held together in unity with God. The church is the earthly reality of God's own triune unity in diversity, and this has implications for our lives as we navigate a complex and often divided world.

On the Day of Pentecost, the nations were brought together by the Holy Spirit. The divides and barriers of language and culture, of human perception of one another, were overcome by the divine unity of the church gathered in the Holy Spirit. The church is the expression of God's diversity, held in unity with Christ at the center. We know the triune God through Jesus who calls God the Father, himself the Son, and promises the Holy Spirit. Jesus invites each of us into this divine unity, where we discover that what unites us is much greater that what divides us.

We need one another because no one can completely express God alone. We need one another to grasp the fullness of God, and yet faith never exhausts our understanding of God. Just as the three persons of the Trinity need one another, so too, we need one another to express God's love for the world so that all might believe.

During June, the festivals of Pentecost and Holy Trinity help us celebrate our life together in God's triune mystery. It is interesting to me how these festivals, in contrast to Christmas and Easter, often go unnoticed by the world – evidence that the world continues to have difficulty living in and knowing God.

How is God overcoming the barriers and divisions of our hearts so that the world might believe and know God's love? How is God calling you to use your unique personality and gifts, bringing you into ever greater unity with your neighbor? God loves you, needs you, and is calling you to love others.



Ethnic Restaurant Group



St. Mark's Book Study Group




The St. Mark's Book Group's next meeting will be Thursday, June 26, at 10 am in the large conference room and via Zoom. This month's selection is The Boys in the Boat by Daniel James Brown. This is a work of historical fiction about the nine working-class boys from the University of Washington's eight-oar team that represented the US in rowing at the 1936 Summer Olympics in Berlin. They narrowly beat out Italy and Germany to win the gold medal. They never expected to surpass the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain, but they did.

There are two backstories. One illustrates how all nine members of the Washington team came from lower-middle-class families and had to struggle to earn their way through school during the depths of the depression. The second backstory begins with a depiction of Hitler decreeing construction of the spectacular German venues at which the Games would take place. Along the way, the book also describes how the Nazis successfully covered up the evidence of their harsh and inhumane treatment of the Jews and other minorities so as to win worldwide applause for the Games, duping the United States Olympic Committee, among others.



Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"Alleluia! Sing to Jesus" ELW 392

This hymn was written in as a communion hymn in 1866 by William C. Dix (1837-1898). It was published in his Altar Songs (1867) under the title "Redemption by the Precious Blood" He had a successful career as a marine insurance manager in Glasgow, Scotland, but developed a second career as a writer of hymns, Christmas and Easter carols, as well as other religious verses, devotional books, and instructions for children. In addition to this hymn, our Evangelical Lutheran Worship includes two additional hymns by Dix: "As with Gladness Men of Old" ELW 302, and "What Child Is This" ELW 296. The tune HYFRYDOL is a Welsh tune composed by Rowland H. Prichard (1811-1887). HYFRYDOL means delightful, beautiful, sweet and melodious. This popular hymn tune is paired with four different hymn texts in our hymnal.

"You, Lord, Are Both Lamb and Shepherd" ACS 954 from All Creation Sings

Susan Dunstan (1955-1993) has served as a pastor and as a duty chaplain in a maximum-security jail. Dunstan says she wrote this hymn in 1984 while commuting on a bus after a particularly bad day at the jail. It was later published in In Search of Hope & Grace under the title "Christus Paradox." All Creation Sings pairs Dunstan's text with the seventeenth century French folk tune PICARDY, named for that region of France.

"I Know That My Redeemer Lives!" ELW 619

This hymn was penned by Samuel Medley (1738-1799) a former British sailor, converted by reading a sermon by Isaac Watts and then serving as a Baptist minster. The heart of his message is inspired by a passage from Job 19:25 "For I know that my Redeemer lives." We will sing only stanzas one through four, and eight. Please note how many times we sing the phrase "He Lives": seventeen times in just these five stanzas by my count! The tune DUKE STREET was composed by Englishman John Hatton, a Presbyterian who was born in Warrington, England, and who lived on Duke Street in St. Helen's in the township of Windle, Lancaster (or Lancashire).

"Praise the Lord, Rise Up Rejoicing" ELW 544

This hymn and its tune are a great example of a successful pairing of a contemporary text with a tune that was composed nearly three hundred years earlier. Howard C. A. Gaunt, (1902-1983) an Anglican priest and a schoolteacher, wrote this text and was first printed in 100 Hymns for Today (London, 1969). The tune ALLES IST AN GOTTES SEGEN ("With God's blessing is everything obtained") also ELW 589 "All Depends on Our Possessing" was composed by Johann Lohner (1645-1705) and was first penned as a vocal solo, with lots of ornamentation. Lohner wrote over three hundred songs like this one, for devotional use in the home.

"Now All the Vault of Heaven Resounds" ELW 367

This Easter hymn was first published in the Service Book and Hymnal (1958). The author is Paul Zeller Strodach (1876-1947) a Lutheran Pastor and author of numerous devotional and liturgical books, including The Church Year: Studies in the Introits, Collects, Epistles, and Gospels (Philadelphia,1924). Notice the phrase "Christ has triumphed! He is living!", uses the same rhythmic and melodic ostinato five times in the first three stanzas. The fourth stanza, a doxology in praise of the Trinity, concludes "Christ has triumphed!" with an "Alleluia!" Strodach intended this hymn to be paired with the sixteenth-century German tune LASST UNS ERFREUEN. Though a vocally "athletic" tune, it spans only one octave. Dr. Paul Westermeyer writes in his Hymnal Companion to Evangelical Lutheran Worship (2010) "Strodach knew what he was doing when he used this tune for a text that joins the song of heaven and earth and has the incarnational exchange of the heaven's vault on the low end and the earth's "here" on the high."

We Sing the Faith

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"God, We Gather as Your People" ACS 1038

This hymn comes to us from the worship supplement All Creation Sings (Augsburg Fortress, 2020) and was written in 2007, in honor of the retirement of the directors of the Opening and Affirming Coalition of the United Church of Christ, an organization that is working for the full inclusion of LGBTQ people into the life and leadership, a sibling organization to Reconciling Works: Lutherans for Full Participation. The hymn and its tune WELCOME BE OUR SONG were written by David Lohman (b. 1961) currently director of music at St. Luke Presbyterian Church in Minnetonka, Minnesota. In addition to his work with the church, and as a composer, pianist and singer, he was the associate conductor on the national tour of The Phantom of the Opera (1995-1999). This hymn is better known in non-Lutheran circles as "For All the Children". Lohman's hymn prays for the welcome that Christ gives to all people; that our hearts, minds, and church doors may know that welcome in the grace and mercy of God; and that, even in the brokenness of our fallen world, we may all be free.

"The Peace of the Lord" ELW 646 (Spanish title: "La paz del Senor")

This text and its tune LA PAZ DEL SENOR were written in 1968 by Anders Ruuth (b.1926). Ruuth was born in Stockholm, Sweden and was a pastor in Argentina and a professor of Theology in Buenos Aires. The hymn was written in Spanish, with an English translation done by Gerhard Cartford (b.1923). According to Cartford, Ruuth wrote the hymn for his seminary students to teach the meaning of the assembly's sharing in the greeting of peace during the eucharist. It is laid out in two parts. The first half is three phrases that ponder peace by repetition and lead to where it is found--in Jesus. The second half explores the nature of this peace--for us, for all God's children, and among us to be received and shared--and repeats the exploration.

"Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise" ELW 834

Walter Chalmers Smith (1824-1908) a minister of the Free Church of Scotland, published this hymn in his Hymns of Christ and the Christian Life (London, 1867). The text is based on 1 Timothy 1:17 "To the King of ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever." He uses "light" to describe the invisible nature of God. The splendor of God's glory makes it impossible for mortals to see God's full greatness. Smith's text is set to the tune ST. DENIO, a lively Welsh tune "discovered" by John Roberts (1807-1876) a self-taught musician who wrote down folk tunes in his native Wales.

"In Christ There Is o East or West" ELW 650

John Oxenham (1852-1941), an English Congregational Church layperson, wrote this text in 1908 for a pageant presented by the London Missionary Society, and was later published in a book of poems called Bees in Amber (1913). Oxenham's text is an example of a prophetic hymn, one that states the ideal to be achieved rather than the present situation. Austin Lovelace writes: "Unity and mission are combined, for the mark of a disciple is love for every person and the willingness to serve all humankind.". Oxenham based this hymn on Galatians 3:28 "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus." The tune MCKEE is thought to be an African American adaptation of a tune sung by Irish immigrants to the United States. Henry T. Burleigh (1866-1949) is the arranger and named the tune for his rector Elmer M. McKee at St. George's Episcopal Church in New York City. Burleigh served as baritone soloist for fifty-two years at McKee's church.
