¹For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery. ¹³For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters, only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become enslaved to one another. ¹⁴For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." 15If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. ¹⁶Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. ¹⁷For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit







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Music Notes

"Be Thou My Vision" ELW 793 This anonymous Irish hymn dates to the eighth century. It was translated in 1905 by Mary E Byrne (1880-1931) and then versed by Eleanor H. Hull (1860-1935) published in *Poem-Book of the Gael* (London, 1912). This text is a personal prayer for the vision of God throughout life, as we acknowledge God to be "my light...my treasure...my power...Ruler of all." This hymn was first joined to the Irish folk tune **SLANE** in the Irish *Church Hymnal* (Dublin, 1919), named for the hill where Saint Patrick is supposed to have defied the king by lighting the new fire at the Easter Vigil.

"Here I Am, Lord" ELW 574 Daniel Laurent Schutte (b. 1947), an American Jesuit priest, and composer of Catholic liturgical music, wrote this hymn for commitment and sending forth of Christ's disciples for a service of ordination in 1979. It is based on Isaiah 6:8 "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!" God's mission and purpose is clearly stated, with each stanza telling the needs of the people and then the care God will provide. This hymn comes to Evangelical Lutheran Worship from With One Voice (1995). Schutte composed the tune HERE I AM, LORD. He has written over 150 hymns and Mass settings.

"All My Hope on God Is Founded" ELW 757 Written by Joachim Neander (1650-1680), a seventeenth-century pietistic German pastor and hymn writer, this hymn began as a five-stanza hymn intended to be sung as a "grace after meal". Based on I Timothy 6:17, this is a hymn of praise to the Creator and Sustainer of all creation: God, never-failing, constantly good, just, and caring. Bristish composer Herbert Howells (1892-1983) wrote the tune MICHAEL for this hymn. It was named for Howell's son Michael, who died as a child.

This Week: From the Lutheran Church Calendar

June 29, Peter and Paul, Apostles

On this day we remember two different apostles. One denied Christ and the other persecuted Christ and his church. They held differing early views of the church, and yet our understanding of the gospel is richer because of their different theological perspectives. However, they are united by the tradition that says they were martyred together on this date in 67 or 68 AD. For us they are also united in their common confession of Christ Jesus, which is the foundation of the "one holy catholic and apostolic church" that we confess.

July 1, John Mason Neale (1818-1866); Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878); hymn translators

Neale was an English priest associated with the movement for church renewal at Cambridge. Winkworth lived most of her life in Manchester, where she was involved in promoting women's rights. These two hymn writers translated many hymn texts into English. Catherine Winkworth devoted herself to the translation of German hymns, nineteen of which are included in the ELW; the fourteen hymn translations of John Mason Neale, included in the ELW, represent his specialization in ancient Latin and Greek hymns.

July 3, Thomas, Apostle

Thomas is perhaps best remembered as "Doubting Thomas," yet Thomas was also fiercely loyal to Jesus, saying, "Let us also go, that we may die with him" (John 11:16). Thomas is also a model for us of the movement from doubt to faith in the Gospel of John. His bold confession, "My Lord and my God" (John 20:28), occurs after Easter, again modeling for us what means as people of faith to live into our confession of Christ. The ancient tradition of the church is that Thomas traveled to India with the gospel establishing a Christian tradition there that has flourished from antiquity to the present.
