

Holy Baptism and Reception of New Member

Presentation

The candidates for baptism and sponsors gather at the font, and the pastor addresses the assembly.

God, who is rich in mercy and love, gives us a new birth into a living hope through the sacrament of Holy Baptism. By water and the word God delivers us from sin and death and raises us to a new life in Jesus Christ. We are united with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world.

The sponsors present the candidates.

I present Michael Andrew Lepkowski for Holy Baptism. (Pastor McKenzie)

I present Finley Hope Lepkowski for Holy Baptism. (Kate Zumas)

The pastor addresses the candidate for baptism.

Called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, Michael Andrew do you desire to do be baptized into Christ?

I do.

The pastor addresses the parents.

Called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, do you desire to have your child baptized into Christ?

I do.

As you bring your child to receive the gift of baptism, you are entrusted with responsibilities: to live with her among God's faithful people, bring her to the word of God and the holy supper, teach her the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, place in her hands the holy scriptures, and nurture her in faith and prayer, so that your child may learn and trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace. Do you promise to help your child grow in the Christian faith and life?

I do.

The pastor addresses the sponsors.

Do you promise to nurture these persons in the Christian faith as you are empowered by God's Spirit, and to help them live in the covenant of baptism and in communion with the church?

I do.

The pastor addresses the assembly.

People of God, do you promise to support Michael Andrew and Finley Hope and pray for them in their new life in Christ?

We do.

Profession of Faith

The pastor addresses the candidates. The assembly may join in the responses.

I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin and confess the faith of the church.

Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God?

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God?

I renounce them.

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

I renounce them.

The pastor addresses the candidates, sponsors and assembly. Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty,
Creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord,
Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,
born of the virgin Mary,
suffered under Pontius Pilate,
was crucified, died, and was buried;
he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Thanksgiving at the Font

The pastor leads the thanksgiving.

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning your Spirit moved over the waters and by your Word you created the world, calling forth life in which you took delight. Through the waters of the flood you delivered Noah and his family, and through the sea you led your people Israel from slavery into freedom. At the river your Son was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By the baptism of Jesus' death and resurrection you set us free from the power of sin and death and raise us up to live in you.

Pour out your Holy Spirit, the power of your living Word, that those who are washed in the waters of baptism may be given new life. To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever.


Distribution of Holy Communion



Music Notes

"O Beautiful for Spacious Skies" ELW 888 Katherine Lee Bates (1859-1929) head of the English department at Wellesley College, MA, wrote this hymn in July 1893 during a trip to Pikes Peak, Colorado. She writes, "it was then and there, looking out over the sea-like expanse of fertile country spreading away so far under those ample skies, that the opening line of the hymn floated into my mind." On the way to Colorado, she stopped at the Columbian World Exposition in Chicago, where the "white city" exhibition was the source for the words "alabaster cities" in the final stanza. Samuel A. Ward (1848-1903) organist at Grace Episcopal Church in New York City is the composer of the tune MATERNA. It was first paired with the hymn "O Mother Dear, Jerusalem" (1888), this text being the inspiration for the name MATERNA or 'motherly". It wasn't until 1912 that Ward's tune was paired with Bate's hymn.

"Great Is Thy Faithfulness" ELW 733 was written in 1923 by Thomas Chisholm (1866-1960). The refrain is from Lamentations 3:23 "they are new every morning; great is thy faithfulness", as well as a verse from James 1:17 in the first stanza "there is no shadow of turning with thee; due to change." Kenneth Osbeck writes: "of the many gospel hymns written on the theme of God's goodness and faithfulness, this hymn stands out like a beacon of light. While many hymns are born out of a particular dramatic experience, this hymn was simply the result of the author's morning by morning realization of God's personal faithfulness". William M. Runyan (1870-1957) wrote the tune **FAITHFULNESS** for this hymn at the request of the hymn's author

"God's Work, Our Hands" ACS 1000 from All Creation Sings. In 2019 the ELCA sponsored a competition for a new hymn based on the theme "God's Work, Our Hands". The first Sunday after Labor Day had been designated as "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday, where congregations are encouraged to emphasize works of service in their local communities. More than 120 submissions were received and judged, with this hymn by Wayne L. Wold (b.1954) declared the winner. David N. Johnson (1922-1987) is the composer of the tune **EARTH AND ALL STARS**.

This Week: From the Lutheran Church Calendar

July 6, Jan Hus, martyr (c.1369-1415)

Jan Hus was a Bohemian priest who spoke against abuses in the church of his day in many of the same ways that Luther would a century later. He preached against the withholding of the cup from the laity at the Eucharist and against the selling of indulgences. He was found guilty of heresy by the Council of Constance (1414-1417) and burned at the stake. The followers of Hus became known as the Czech Brethren, and eventually continued as the Moravian Church.

July 11, Benedict of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Cassino (c.480-c.547)

Benedict is known as the father of Western monasticism. He was educated in Rome but was appalled by the decline of life around him. He went to live as a hermit, and a community of monks came to gather around him. In the prologue of his rule for monasteries, he wrote that his intent in drawing up regulations was "to set down nothing harsh, nothing burdensome." It is that moderate spirit that characterizes his rule and the monastic communities that are formed by it. The tradition of Benedict still encourages a generous spirit of hospitality in that visitors to Benedictine communities are to be welcomed as Christ himself.

July 12, Nathan Söderblom, Bishop of Uppsala (1866-1931)

Söderblom was a Swedish theologian, ecumenist, and social activist, who received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1930. Söderblom was Archbishop of Uppsala, the head of the Lutheran Church in Sweden. He saw the value of the liturgical movement, and valued the work of liberal Protestant scholars, believing that social action was a first step on the path toward a united Christianity. He organized the Universal Christian Council on Life and Work, one of the organizations that, in 1948, came together to found the World Council of Churches.
