

Dear Friends in Christ,

Luke 14 has been called "the table talks" because Jesus is concerned about how we use our tables and who we invite to them. In Luke 14 Jesus makes our response to God's grace the center of discipleship to him, urging us to share with those who have no way of repaying us.

If we are honest, all that we possess is a gift from God, often received through the hands of others. Though we each work hard, the gifts of life, time, and ability are gifts we have very little to do with. We either use them or do not use them; we either share them or do not share them with others.

Jesus is describing a world based upon reciprocal transactions – a world where some expect to profit from their generosity to others. People and even nations continue to set conditions upon "gifts" that ensure themselves a profit from those in need.

Yet the generosity Jesus describes is completely different. It is founded on a humility that understands generosity as compassion and mercy to others. Jesus calls us blessed when we help those who cannot repay us: when we feed the poor, welcome the vulnerable, and help those in distress. For Jesus, the sharing of possessions is a sign of discipleship.

Perhaps you know the feeling of having been helped by someone yet can never fully repay their generosity. At times, I think we are losing sight of such generosity – a generosity that lifts and helps others. The greatness of individuals and nations is always demonstrated through such generosity, through the humility of self-giving service to others in need.

This month I invite you to learn more about Bread for the World, an organization helping churches to advocate with our leaders to generously share the gifts of tables, food and resources for the poor and hungry who cannot repay us. Jesus Christ says, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty" (John 6:35). Jesus feeds you so that you might feed others.

July Council Highlights

Summary of St. Mark's Lutheran Congregation Council Meeting – July 14, 2025

The meeting, called to order by Chris Stevenson at 7:06 PM with full attendance of the council, included a devotion by Palmer Stevenson. The June minutes were approved with minor corrections. Treasurer Andrea Long reported that while June contributions fell short, expenses remained under budget. Bank interest yields were discussed, and clarification was made regarding account types. Committee budget drafts are due by August 18.

Pastor Tim McKenzie highlighted a letter from Bishop Smith on refugee resettlement, calling for support amid federal funding cuts. Brooks Stevenson outlined refugee support tasks. Pastor Tim also noted congregational events, including honoring Gabe Slesinger for his contributions to St. Mark's prior to his departure to Finland where he will be 1st Chair in one of the oldest Orchestras in Europe. Pastor McKenzie also visited Shirley Larson who is the oldest living member of St. Marks. Pastor also mentioned the planned rededication of the Columbarium on All Saints Sunday, 11/2. A congratulatory card will be displayed and signed for incoming Bishop Emily Hartner who started her career at St. Mark's.

The Property Committee discussed beautifying the front lawn instead of reinstalling a purchased fence. The church will continue parking partnerships with Ronald McDonald House and Duke Mansion. The discussions also included possible upcoming asbestos remediation in Fellowship Hall.

Chris Stevenson emphasized council succession planning, requesting nominations by August 1, and announced the Annual Congregation Meeting for October 26. The council thanked Palmer Stevenson for his contributions as youth liaison and member of the council. The council will recess in August unless needed. The meeting adjourned at 8:58 PM.

Welcome Bishop Emily Hartner!



The Rev. Emily Hartner was elected Bishop of the North Carolina Synod of the ELCA on May 31, 2025 at the Synod Assembly held at the Koury Convention Center in Greensboro, NC. She assumes the Office of Bishop on August 1, 2025.

Though Pastor Emily is well-known to St. Mark's as Associate Pastor (2010-2017), she has many other accomplishments and experiences. She is a graduate of Davidson College (Psychology and French, 2003), Yale Divinity School (M.Div. 2007), and Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (Master of Sacred Theology, 2012). She has served on the ELCA Church Council, 2019-2025; the NC Synod Council, 2013-2019; the NC Synod Discipline Committee, 2019-present; and was Dean of the

Mecklenburg/Union Conference of the NC Synod, 2021-2025. Since leaving St. Mark's, Pastor Hartner served as the Pastor of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Charlotte.

Bishop Emily Hartner will be installed as Bishop on November 15, 2025 (2 pm) at Christ Lutheran Church in Charlotte. Please remember Bishop Hartner as she begins her work, shepherding the churches and ministries of our synod. — Pastor Tim McKenzie

St. Mark's Scholarship Awards

The St. Mark's Endowment Committee is pleased to announce the recipients of the Nola Beatrice Blackwelder leadership scholarships for the 2025/2026 school year. This scholarship was established in 1990 through a bequest from the estate of Nola Beatrice Blackwelder, a long-time member of St. Mark's who passed away in 1989. Part of the instructions in her bequest was to establish a scholarship for Mecklenburg County Lutherans, particularly St. Mark's members, who attend Lutheran seminaries or attend Lutheran colleges and are considering a church vocation of some sort. Over the years, the Blackwelder scholarship fund has grown to over \$400,000 in principal value and has awarded tens of thousands of dollars in scholarships.

Did You Know?

Did you know that St. Mark's is blessed to have two educational scholarship funds available to St. Mark's members?



Bread for the World Advocacy



Jason Blanton of Bread for the World will speak at St. Mark's on 8/24 and lead a discussion at the 9:30 am Faith Forum in the Large Conference Room.

18 million U.S. households experienced food insecurity in 2023. As Christians, we are called to seek justice and to care for those experiencing hunger and poverty, and at St. Mark's we have a long history of loving and serving those in need through ministries such as Room in the Inn, Loaves and Fishes, Habitat for Humanity and our Soup Kitchen. Another tool we can use is the power of our voices in advocating to legislators in support of policies that serve the most vulnerable.

Bread for the World (BFW or Bread) is a non-partisan, ecumenical Christian organization that has been advocating in Congress for 50 years to end hunger and poverty both here in the US and overseas. Each year, Bread's Offering of Letters (OL) campaign engages people of faith in writing personalized letters to Congress on issues related to hunger. In churches across the country, these letters are presented as an offering to God before being mailed to Congress. Combined, these OLs result in tens of thousands of letters which, over the years, have helped inspire our leaders in Washington, D.C. to pass legislation that has impacted millions of people.

Earlier this year, St. Mark's Council approved a team to organize our first Offering of Letters in support of maintaining funding for critical programs for hungry people. In the coming weeks, we will hold educational sessions to introduce BFW, explore the biblical basis for advocacy, and learn about the specific issues related to hunger and poverty in front of Congress this year. We will conclude with an event providing opportunities to write letters to our Representatives and Senators who have the power to impact funding decisions.

Let me be clear: the Offering of Letters does not require St. Mark's to adopt any political positions in support of specific policies. It is, instead, an opportunity for the people of St. Mark's to learn about and use another tool of ministry – the power of advocacy – that we can use to support those in need. Please pray for this new ministry and how you may be called to participate.










St. Mark's Book Study Group






Jesus Through the Centuries (1985, Yale). Jaroslav Pelikan (1923-2006) was a Lutheran / Orthodox theologian, raised in Chicago in the Slovak Evangelical Lutheran Church. Graduating from Concordia Seminary (St. Louis), Pelikan earned a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago, teaching at Yale his entire career. Pelikan's own spiritual journey led him from the LCMS, to the LCA and ELCA, and finally to membership in the Orthodox Church in America. Published widely, his many works include The Christian Tradition: A History of the Development of Doctrine (5 Vols.); Christianity and Classical Culture (Gifford Lectures, 1993); Mary Through the Centuries (1996); Credo (Yale, 2003); Whose Bible Is It? (2005). Pelikan's writings, like his life,

were ecumenical — a search of understanding about the Christian tradition, its doctrines and worship. Jesus Through the Centuries is an exploration of the many different understandings of Christ over a two thousand year period. This book opens us to seeing the many dimensions of Jesus as the world has seen him — all of them true and illuminating. (Pastor McKenzie)

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"O Beautiful for Spacious Skies" ELW 888

Katherine Lee Bates (1859-1929) head of the English department at Wellesley College, MA, wrote this hymn in July 1893 during a trip to Pikes Peak, Colorado. She writes, "it was then and there, looking out over the sea-like expanse of fertile country spreading away so far under those ample skies, that the opening line of the hymn floated into my mind." On the way to Colorado, she stopped at the Columbian World Exposition in Chicago, where the "white city" exhibition was the source for the words "alabaster cities" in the final stanza. Samuel A. Ward (1848-1903) organist at Grace Episcopal Church in New York City is the composer of the tune MATERNA. It was first paired with the hymn "O Mother Dear, Jerusalem" (1888), this text being the inspiration for the name MATERNA or 'motherly". It wasn't until 1912 that Ward's tune was paired with Bate's hymn.

"As We Gather at Your Table" ELW 522

522 American Episcopal priest and hymnologist Carl P. Daw, Jr. (b. 1944) wrote this hymn as part of a tricentennial celebration that commemorated the founding in 1689 of Eastern Shore Chapel Episcopal Church in Virginia Beach, Virginia. He describes the three stanzas this way. The first "calls attention to the two interrelated parts of the Eucharist, Word and Table, by intentionally mixing the language associated with each part." The second "is largely derived from the post-communion prayer of the Eucharist...The third and fourth lines are a reworking of the Dismissal: 'Go in peace to love and serve the Lord." The parable of the banquet in Matthew 22 and Luke 14 stands behind the third stanza. The final line of the hymn quotes the second stanza of Isaac Watt's hymn "Joy to the World" ELW 267, "repeat the sounding joy." Daw's hymn is wedded to the Dutch folk melody IN BABILONE, one of three pairings in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship: "Holy Spirit, Ever Dwelling" ELW 582 & "Son of God, Eternal Savior" ELW 655.

"Spirit of God, Descend upon My Heart" ELW 800

George Croly, (1780-1860) ordained in the Church of Ireland, spent the majority of his career serving congregations in the poorer sections of London. This is his most popular hymn, published after his death in Lyra Britannica (London, 1867). This hymn is based on Galatians 5:25 "If we live by the spirit, let us also be guided by the spirit." It is a personal prayer for God's Spirit to take over our life, purify it, and fill it with the pure love of angels. The symbolism of the dove and the flame for the Holy Spirit is used in the final stanza with these words: "The kindling of the heaven-descended Dove, my heart an altar, and thy love the flame." The tune MORECAMBE was composed originally for "Abide with Me" ELW 629 by Frederick C. Atkinson (1841-1896),and is named for Morecambe, near Bradford, where Atkinson was organist at St. Luke's Church.

"Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise" ELW 834

Scottish Pastor, Walter Chalmers Smith (1824-1908) wrote this hymn in six stanzas and included it in his Hymns of Christ and the Christian Life (London, 1867). The four stanzas included in our hymnal are based on I Timothy 1:17, "To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever". Randy Stevens writes in his book Be Still My Soul, "In this hymn of pure praise, Smith acknowledges that at times, God seems hidden from us--inaccessible--not because of any lack of love on his part but rather because we are not capable of beholding his full glory. It is the splendor of light that hides him". In 1906 British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams was the first to pair this text to the eighteenth-century Welsh tune ST. DENIO. The tune title refers to St. Denis, the patron saint of France. ST. DENIO is based on a traditional Welsh ballad "A Hundred Years from Now" popular in the nineteenth century.

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

"Seek Ye First"

This popular hymn is not included in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship, but does appear in a number of supplemental collections, including This Far by Faith (Minneapolis, 1999). Karen Lafferty (b. 1948), an American composer, musician and recording artist, is the writer of the first stanza, as well as composer of the tune LAFFERTY. She is the founder and director of Musicians for Missions, an international ministry based in Amsterdam. Seek Ye First was written in 1971, inspired by a bible study on Matthew 6:33. She describes it as "a song in which people can put God's desire for their lives above their own." The second stanza is based on Matthew 7:7 and was included in Songs for Celebration, 1980.

"What a Friend We Have in Jesus" ELW 742

was written in 1855 by Joseph Scriven (1819-1886) as a comfort for his sick mother. Joseph was born in Ireland but moved to Canada in 1844 at the age of twenty-five. The great American gospel hymn composer Ira Sankey (1840-1908) wrote of Scriven: Until a short time before his death, it was not known that he had a poetic gift. A neighbor sitting up with him in his illness, happened upon a manuscript copy of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Reading it with great delight and questioning Mr. Scriven about it, he said he composed it for his mother, to comfort her in a time of special sorrow, not intending that anyone else should see it. Sometime later, when another Port Hope, Ontario neighbor asked him if it was true he composed the hymn, his reply was "The Lord and I did it between us." The tune CONVERSE was paired with this hymn by Ira Sankey. Charles Converse (1832-1918) composed the tune and was first published in 1870 under the pseudonym Karl Reden, a German form of his name (reden = "to speak" or "converse").
