

¹Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, To our beloved coworker Philemon, ²to our sister Apphia, to our fellow soldier Archippus, and to the church in your house: ³Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. 4I thank my God always when I mention you in my prayers, 5because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. 6I pray that the partnership of your faith may become effective as you comprehend all the good that we share in Christ. 7I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother. 8For this reason, though I am more than bold enough in Christ to command you to do the right thing, 9yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love—and I, Paul, do this as an old man and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. ¹⁰I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. ¹¹Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful to you and to me. ¹²I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. ¹³ I wanted to keep him with me so that he might minister to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel, ¹⁴but I preferred to do nothing without your consent in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. ¹⁵Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for the long term, ¹⁶no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother—especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. ¹⁷So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. ¹⁸If he has wronged you in any way or owes you anything, charge that to me. ¹⁹I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I

will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. ²⁰Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. ²¹Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I ask. ²²One thing more: prepare a guest room for me, for I am hoping through your prayers to be restored to you. ²³Epaphras, my fellow prisoner in Christ Jesus, sends greetings to you, ²⁴and so do Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, and Luke, my coworkers. ²⁵The grace of

Fall Drive for Pat's Place Pat's Place is a child advocacy agency that coordinates the investigation, treatment and prosecution of guilty parties of the most severe cases of child abuse, or any child witnessing a violent crime. After these young people have been brought to the agency by a parent, police officer or DSS, they are interviewed, medically treated and statements taken privately by trained professionals. The agency then proceeds and the child is free to leave, but not before choosing a gift to take home with them. That's where we can help. We are requesting donations to replenish these gifts as a couple hundred small gifts are needed each year. Suggestions of these items are listed on the poster in the gathering place and below. Please help replace the children's arrival tears with a parting smile! Donation Suggestions: Young children: small dolls (white, brown and black skin), small stuffed animals, matchbox cars, small trucks, books (English & Spanish), coloring books & crayons, cards (Uno, Old Maid, etc), activity books,

and hair bows. Teenagers: journals, craft items, colored pencils, stretch bracelets, nail polish, frisbees, and balls. Music Notes

"Lift High the Cross" ELW 660 was first published in 1916, and included eleven stanzas! Evangelical Lutheran Worship only includes five stanzas, with a rousing refrain. Stanley Osborne writes of this hymn: "The hymn has no room for weak resignation. It summons the mightiest and leaves them gazing upon a Love that gave its life to achieve life." American hymnologist Austin Lovelace says: "It is related to 'Onward Christian Soldiers' and 'For All the Saints' ELW 422 in its symbolism of marching in the ranks of soldiers of the crucified. It is the crucified Christ and his cross which we follow, and his love we proclaim to the world." The tune CRUCIFER was written by Sydney Nicholson (1875-1947) for this hymn text. He was organist at Westminster Abbey from 1918 to 1927, and founder of the Royal School of Church Music. CRUCIFER means "cross-bearer."

"Will You Come and Follow Me" (The Summons) ELW 798 This hymn was written by John Bell (b.1949) in 1986-87 for the Iona Community in Scotland. In his own words: "this text was written for the sending out of one of our youth volunteers. Young people gave a year or two to live in impoverished parts of Scotland. When they finished, my colleague and I would often write a song for their farewell ceremony. The words reflect the experience of the volunteer concerned." The tune name **KELVINGROVE** is named for a place in Glasgow, Scotland.

"God's Work, Our Hands" ACS 1000 (*All Creation Sings, 2020*) This hymn was written in 2019 in response to the ELCA sponsored competition for a new hymn based on the theme "God's Work, Our Hands." Wayne L. Wold (b. 1954) received the top honor out of 120 submissions. *All Creation Sings* pairs Wold's hymn with the tune **EARTH AND ALL STARS**, composed by David N. Johnson (1922-1987) for the hymn "Earth and All Stars" ELW 731, as well as the Easter hymn "Alleluia! Jesus Is Risen!" ELW 377.

This Week: From the Lutheran Church Calendar

September 9, Peter Claver, priest, missionary to Columbia (1580-1654)

Peter Claver was born into Spanish nobility and was persuaded to become a Jesuit missionary. He served in Cartagena (in what is now Columbia) by teaching and caring for slaves. The slaves arrived in ships, where they had been confined in dehumanizing conditions. Claver met and supplied them with medicine, food, clothing, and brandy. He learned their dialects and taught them Christianity. He called himself the "slave of slaves forever." Claver also ministered to the locals of Cartagena who were in prison and facing death.

September 13, John Chrysostom, Bishop of Constantinople (c.349-407)

John was a priest at Antioch and an outstanding preacher. His eloquence learned him the name "Chrysostom" ("golden mouth"), but it also got him into trouble with the royal court for his preaching against corruption. The empress who had been a supporter sent him into exile. His sermons remain in print, and continue to inspire contemporary readers.
