

Dear Friends in Christ,

As we prepare to celebrate the Reformation at the end of October, we remember Martin Luther's rediscovery of justification by grace through faith. As Paul writes, "a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law," Luther also emphasized faith as God's gift of grace justifying and freeing us from sin.

In the Lectures on Galatians (LW 26:130) Luther writes, "Faith justifies because it takes hold of and possesses the treasure – the present Jesus Christ." Luther is describing the mystery of Jesus Christ present within us through faith. Luther's rediscovery of the gospel of grace through faith continues to help us hear the good news. Luther writes, "The law says, 'do this,' and it is never done. Grace says, 'believe this,' and everything is already done" (LW 31:56). The treasure of Christ is already present in every heart that believes in him.

Today, the Reformation seems like a distant history lesson, yet the faith that Paul and Luther describe is new every day. Luther writes, "It is Christ who dwells in the heart. Where faith is, there is Christ" (LW 26:130). Christ dwells in hearts across time, culture, and language. Through faith he is present in you wherever you go.

In a world that calculates human worth by nation, works, and wealth, the treasure of Christ gives each person infinite value. Through faith, without any works or merit of our own, we know a priceless grace that makes all people brothers and sisters, one in Christ. In a world of the loud and proud who boast of their works, faith boasts only in Christ's work alive and new each day.

The Reformation faith we celebrate is always active in love and good works. Faith bears fruitful works always striving for justice, peace, and inclusion for all in Christ's body.

This is the self-denial of faith to which Jesus calls us. Justified by faith and freed from sin, we follow Jesus daily working for God and neighbor in this world. Faith frees your hands and voices to be Christ present for others.

Imagine your voice and hands without Jesus. This month take time to give thanks to God for the grace and gift of faith. He allows you to do, to give, and to be in ways you never imagined. With Jesus Christ present in you, all things are possible for him.

# September Council Highlights

#### St. Mark's Congregation Council Meeting Summary.

The Congregation Council of St. Mark's Lutheran met on September 8, 2025, with full attendance and guests Meg Fielding and Cliff Edahl present. Devotions were led by John Simon, and minutes from both the amended July 25 and August 13 meetings were approved. The treasury report showed that July finished with a surplus, thanks to early pledge payments and lower expenses despite additional HVAC costs, while August saw the usual summer giving shortfall but still ended with a surplus.

Pastor Tim McKenzie highlighted recent worship and ministry events, including the farewell to Gabriel Sleisinger, the blessing of lumber for Habitat for Humanity, and preparations for All Saints "Homecoming Sunday" on November 2, which will also rededicate the Columbarium. He also noted the upcoming September 15 memorial service for Nannette Temple. The council joyfully approved the membership of Rodney Buck Stephens, along with Carolyn, Zach, Emery and Eleanor Taylor.

Committee updates included upcoming Congregational Life plans for Advent bags and the congregational dinner. The council received an update from the Property Committee on asbestos discovered in Fellowship Hall floors. A motion was unanimously passed authorizing a contract for asbestos abatement up to \$40,000 using existing renovation funds.

Council President Chris Stevenson recognized the Call Committee, led by Meg Fielding, for its diligent work in preparing to present a Primary Candidate for Associate Pastor. He also reported that three members—Lisa, Nick, and Chris—will be rotating off council, with new nominees and bios due before the October 19 meeting. Andrew Puky has accepted nomination as Youth Representative. Other announcements included the installation of a new Steinway piano.

The meeting closed at 8:21 p.m. with gratitude for the work accomplished and preparations underway for the congregation's future.

As Christians, we are called to seek justice and to care for those experiencing hunger and poverty, and churches are especially important in telling the story of hunger and fostering change. Last month, we at St. Mark's embarked on a new kind of ministry to help those struggling with hunger and poverty – our first Offering of Letters to legislators in Washington, D.C. expressing our support for crucial programs that combat hunger and food insecurity. Specifically, we asked our legislators to:

- Fully fund the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), and strengthen WIC by cosponsoring and passing the MODERN WIC Act.
- Protect and provide robust funding for food aid and global nutrition programs, so that we can reach millions of children with lifesaving assistance.
- Support and pass a Food Date Labeling Act of 2025 which would remove confusion about quality ("best before") date and discard date labels on food packaging.

In total, 64 letters were sent to Representatives Alma Adams, Mark Harris, Tim Moore, and Ralph Norman as well as Senators Ted Budd and Thom Tillis. This was an exceptional response to our first project like this. THANK YOU for your enthusiastic support of this new ministry. Together, our letters to fight hunger make a difference. Over the years, letters, emails, phone calls and in-person meetings have helped inspire our leaders in Washington, D.C., to pass legislation that has impacted millions of people. Thank you again for your support. Together we can and will make a difference.




#### Book & Puzzle Swap October 26

This collection is an English translation of the full scope of Luther's commentaries on scripture, sermons, and theological writings. St. Mark's is blessed to have this collection available for study in our church library!

#### Fellowship Hall Renovation Update

The much-anticipated Fellowship Hall renovation is moving forward with work to be done in phases beginning in November this year.

The first phase of the project has been approved by Council with the removal of the two layers of existing flooring and asbestos abatement in the Fellowship Hall, Scout Room and surrounding hallways. This project will take 10-15 days to complete and is scheduled to commence on or about November 3rd. During this removal and abatement process there will be very limited access to the church building.

The second phase of the project will be refinishing the stage hardwood floor. New flooring throughout the Fellowship Hall, Scout Room and surrounding hallways will follow early next year. Painting, A/V and furnishings will follow with the hope of having the entire project completed by end of second quarter 2026.

Look for the "Finish Board" showing all the finishes in the Gathering Space shortly.

# Property Ministry

#### **Courtyard Renovation**

Taking care of the St. Mark's facility is ongoing with a little seen part of our building being repaired and painted this month. The inner courtyard is rarely seen but has been in disrepair for several years. This month the exterior window frames and surrounding encasements are scheduled to be sandblasted, glass repaired, windows reglazed, and the surrounding encasements brought back to as close to their original design as possible. This is an extensive project requiring scaffolding, special sandblasting material, and electrostatic painting and may take up to four weeks. The pictures show the current state. Weather permitting, by mid-November the Courtyard project will be completed and once again this area of the building brought back to its original design. #### Summer Food Drive for Nourish Up

Our baker's rack will always be awaiting your generous donations of "unbreakable nonperishable" food items. Thank you for your continuous support of this outreach to our community's less fortunate.



#### FALL DRIVE TO ASSIST PAT'S PLACE

PAT'S PLACE is a child advocacy agency that coordinates the investigation, treatment, and prosecution of guilty parties of the most severe cases of child abuse.

These young people are brought to the agency by a parent, police officer or DSS. They are greeted by a staff member and given a snack and bottle of water, If they need medical treatment, this is done by medical professionals in a private room with a 1-way window and a hidden video camera, a trained professional hears their story which is recorded. This can be used in court if necessary, which prevents the young person being present and reliving their trauma. The child is now free to leave but not before choosing a small gift to take with them.

This is where we can help: We are requesting donations of these gifts as a couple hundred are needed each year! That is how many of those abused young people are sadly brought to Pat's Place each year. Suggestions for those items are listed on the poster attached to the easel in the Gathering Place.

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

#### "God's Work, Our Hands" ACS 1000 (All Creation Sings, 2020)

This hymn was written in 2019 in response to the ELCA sponsored competition for a new hymn based on the theme "God's Work, Our Hands." Wayne L. Wold (b. 1954) received the top honor out of 120 submissions. *All Creation Sings* pairs Wold's hymn with the tune EARTH AND ALL STARS, composed by David N. Johnson (1922-1987) for the hymn "Earth and All Stars" ELW 731, as well as the Easter hymn "Alleluia! Jesus Is Risen!" ELW 377.

#### "Savior, like a Shepherd Lead Us" ELW 789

gives us images for both Psalm 23 and the parable of the good shepherd in John 10. The hymn was used as a children's song in the mid-1800's and first appeared in the collection Hymns for the Young (London, 1836) compiled by Dorothy Thrupp (1779-1847), but we don't know for certain she is the author, as she wrote anonymously or under pseudonyms. William Bradbury (1816-1868) American composer, conductor and the founder of his own music publishing company as well as the Bradbury Piano Company, wrote over eight hundred tunes including BRADBURY for this hymn. It was published in his Sunday school book entitled Oriola (1859). Three additional tunes by Bradbury are included in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, including "Just As I Am, without One Plea" ELW 592. "Jesus Loves Me!" ELW 595, and "My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less" ELW 596.

#### "Son of God, Eternal Savior" ELW 655

Somerset C. Lowry (1855-1932) wrote this hymn in 1893. He was born in Ireland and studied at Cambridge, and eventually was ordained an Anglican priest. Dr. Austin Lovelace writes: "Lowry's hymn reminds us that we have a common bond with the whole human race through Christ, that a life of service is required of our stewardship, and that we must pray for peace to end our strife and shame our selfish greed. Our prayer is always 'Thy will be done'." The tune IN BABILONE is a Dutch folk melody that has been adapted as a hymn tune.

#### "Let Streams of Living Justice" ELW 710

William Whitla (b.1934), a priest in the Anglican Church of Canada, wrote this hymn in 1989. It was first published in a collection of hymns *Sing Justice! Do Justice!* The author writes: "I wrote this hymn just after the events in Tiananmen Square, and when the Mothers of the Disappeared in Argentina were bringing their campaign to the conscience of the world. At the same time, the religious and racial disputes in Ireland, Israel-Palestine, the Congo and other parts of Africa, and in Canada and many other countries over First Nation or Aboriginal rights all seemed impossible to solve. Unfortunately, similar events are still replayed, and only too-similar images in the Near East, Iraq, Afghanistan, and now Somalia--recur and are now extended well beyond those earlier sad happenings. So, I used some images from those events in verse one, to tell the bad news before the Good News of the final two verses". The tune THAXTED was composed by Gustav Holst (1874-1934) and comes from his orchestral piece *The Planets* where it is the theme for "Jupiter." Holst lived in Thaxted, Essex, England for most of his life.

#### We Sing the Faith

Historical and Spiritual Insight Into the Hymns We Sing Reflections by Lester Ackerman

#### "God of Grace and God of Glory" ELW 705

was penned in the summer of 1930 by Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969) the famous American theologian, preacher, and the founding pastor of the Riverside Church in New York City. He wrote this prayer hymn for the opening of the then new Riverside Church. He says of this hymn: "that was more than a hymn to me when we sang it that day--it was a very urgent personal prayer. For with all my hopeful enthusiasm about the new venture, there was inevitably much humble and fearful apprehension". Fosdick's text on the mission of the church deals with issues of that day which are still with us: evil, doubts, war, and selfishness. The sturdy Welsh tune CWM RHONDDA (Rhondda Valley) is paired nicely with this text, as well as two additional hymns in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, #618, "Guide Me Ever, Great Redeemer", and #400, "God of Tempest, God of Whirlwind".

#### "Gather Us In" ELW 532

Marty Haugen (b. 1950), American composer of liturgical music, wrote this hymn in 1979 where he credits his inspiration to the hymn "What Is This Place" ELW 524 by Dutch author Huub Oosterhuis. Paul Westermeyer writes: "with the influence of Oosterhuis, Haugen's hymn celebrates an incarnational understanding of God's presence in a physical place where people with flesh and bone come together in welcome. The community of faith gathers to sing around word, water, bread, and wine. It prays that the fire of God's love will fashion it into hearts that are meek and courageous, and lives that are holy and true." The tune GATHER US IN, written by Marty Haugen, was composed for his text.
